in game one on Friday at 5:07 pm AT followed by the Seawolves against Quinnipiac in game two at 8:07 pm AT. On Saturday, Alaska takes on Quinnipiac at 4:07 pm AT with Alaska Anchorage skating against Air Force at 7:07 pm AT.

In all, nine of the 10 league-member teams will be in action this coming weekend, with only Ferris State idle. The Bulldogs, who split their season-opening non-conference set at Colgate (ECAC Hockey) on October 5-6, next play a single game at Mercyhurst of Atlantic Hockey on Tuesday, October 15.

Like Ferris State did, Alabama Huntsville, Bemidji State, Bowling Green, Michigan Tech, Minnesota State and Northern Michigan will all open their regular seasons on the road.

The Alabama Huntsville Chargers, under first-year head coach Mike Corbett, will make their on-ice debut as a WCHA member when the Chargers take on host Northeastern (Hockey East Association) Friday and Saturday evenings in a pair of 7:00 pm ET encounters.

Bemidji State will play a two-game set at St. Cloud State (National Collegiate Hockey Conference) on Friday and Saturday, with both face-offs set for 7:37 pm CT, while Bowling Green will go up against ECAC Hockey-member and host Union, with both puck drops at 7:30 pm ET. Michigan Tech will hit the road for a pair of 7:07 pm CT Friday-Saturday encounters at Minnesota Duluth (NCHC), Minnesota State plays at Providence (HEA) at 7:00 pm ET both nights, and Northern Michigan travels to Big 10 Conference-member Wisconsin in a pair of 7:07 pm CT match ups.

The only other league team playing at home this coming weekend is Lake Superior State. The Lakers hit the Taffy Abel Arena (4,000) ice on Friday night at 7:37 pm ET and Saturday at 5:07 pm ET against Robert Morris of the Atlantic Hockey Association.

In addition to Ferris State's 7-4, 0-1 non-conference split at Colgate last weekend, seven other league teams engaged in a series of home-ice exhibition games. Last Friday (October 4), Alaska Anchorage defeated visiting University of British Columbia 2-1 while on Saturday (October 5), Michigan Tech downed Laurentian University 3-2, Bowling Green rolled past Wilfrid Laurier University 7-1, Alaska blitzed British Columbia 8-1 and Northern Michigan skated past the USA Under-18 Team 3-1. On Sunday (October 6), the NMU Wildcats won 3-2 over Laurentian, Minnesota State powered past University of Lethbridge 7-1 and Lake Superior State dropped a one-goal decision to the USA Under-18 Team, 3-2.

Looking ahead to next week, there will be a pair of single non-conference games on Tuesday, October 15 as Ferris State

will skate at Mercyhurst (AHA) and Bowling Green hosts Ohio State (Big 10).

Week three of the regular season and the weekend of October 18-20 will also continue non-conference competition. Friday-Saturday match ups have Bemidji State entertaining Minnesota (Big 10), Lake Superior State heading to Union (ECAC Hockey), Bowling Green hosting Colgate (ECAC Hockey), Ferris State hosting St. Lawrence (ECAC Hockey), Minnesota State welcoming Connecticut (AHA), Northern Michigan hosting Nebraska Omaha (NCHC), and Alaska hosting fellow league-member Alaska Anchorage along with Denver and Western Michigan of the NCHC for the Alaska Goal Rush at Carlson Center. On Friday and Sunday, Michigan Tech will go up against host Notre Dame (HEA).

The first weekend featuring conference play this season will occur Friday and Saturday, October 25-26, as Michigan Tech and Northern Michigan go home-and-home and Alabama Huntsville hosts Bemidji State. There are a total of 140 WCHA games in 2013-14, with each league-member team playing a total of 28 conference games. Each team will play five other league members four times each and four others two times each. The regular season champion in the men's WCHA is awarded the MacNaughton Cup.

The first round of WCHA playoffs will be contested the weekend of March 14-16, a best-of-three series format that will feature the top eight finishers in regular season competition. The No. 1 seed will host the No. 8 seed, No. 2 will host No. 7, No. 3 will host No. 6 and No. 4 will host No. 5.

Following the first round, the four winners will advance to the 2014 WCHA Final Five, set for March 21-22 at Van Andel Arena



in Grand Rapids, MI. The two semi-final matchups on Friday will feature the No. 3 seed vs the No. 2 seed at 2:07 pm ET and the No. 4 seed vs the No. 1 seed at 7:07 pm ET. On championship Saturday, the contest for the Broadmoor Trophy and the league's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament will face-off at 7:07 pm ET.

The 2014 NCAA Men's Division 1 Ice Hockey Championship tournament will open the weekend of March 28-30 with four regionals. On Friday and Saturday, the NCAA East Regional will be held at Webster Bank Arena in Bridgeport, CT while the NCAA Midwest Regional will be played at US Bank Arena in Cincinnati, OH. On Saturday and Sunday, the NCAA Northeast Regional will be held at DCU Center in Worcester, MA and the NCAA West Regional will be at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, MN.

The four regional winners will then advance to the 2014 NCAA Men's Frozen Four (national championship), to be contested Thursday, April 10 and Saturday, April 12 at Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia, PA.

Minnesota State Tabbed as 2013-14 Preseason Favorite in Mankato Free Press WCHA Men's Hockey Preseason Coaches Poll

Poll Has Ferris State Second, Michigan Tech Third, Bowling Green Fourth; Minnesota State Forward Matt Leitner is WCHA Preseason Player of the Year; Mavericks' Forward Zach Stepan is Preseason Rookie of the Year

September 25, 2013 – Minnesota State has been tabbed as the favorite to win the MacNaughton Cup, garnering nine of 10 first-place votes in the Mankato Free Press WCHA Men's Hockey Preseason Coaches Poll. The Mavericks, who are coming off their best season in a decade, also have the Preseason Player of the Year in junior forward Matt Leitner and the Preseason Rookie of the Year in freshman forward Zach Stepan.

Ferris State was picked to finish second in the league, edging Michigan Tech, which received the other first-place vote. Bowling Green was fourth, followed by Alaska, Northern Michigan, Bemidji State, Lake Superior State, Alaska Anchorage and Alabama Huntsville.

Leitner, a third-team All-WCHA pick last season and the fourth returning point-scorer in the nation (17-30=47), received five votes for Preseason Player of the Year. Michigan Tech sophomore forward Alex Petan (15-19=34) an All-WCHA Rookie Team selection last season, received two votes.

Stepan, a forward who comes to Minnesota State from the USHL's Waterloo Blackhawks, received eight votes for Preseason Rookie of the Year. He was a fourth-round draft pick of the NHL's Nashville Predators in 2012.

Leitner and a pair of Minnesota State teammates, junior defenseman Zach Palmquist and sophomore goaltender Stephon Williams were selected to the Preseason All-WCHA team, along with Petan, Bowling Green junior forward Ryan Carpenter and Ferris State junior defenseman Jason Binkley. Williams was the WCHA's Rookie of the Year last season, as well as a first-team and All-WCHA Rookie Team pick. Carpenter was a second-team All-CCHA selection last season.

Minnesota State Nearly Unanimous in The Bemidji Pioneer WCHA Preseason Media Poll; But League has Parity Leitner, Stepan Named Player, Rookie of the Year

September 24, 2013/BEMIDJI, MN – With six new teams in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association this season, many predicted more parity in the new-look league.

According to members of the WCHA media, that prediction should hold true – although most think Minnesota State will finish on top a year after a fantastic season and an NCAA tournament appearance.

The Bemidji Pioneer WCHA Preseason Media Poll shows the Mavericks as a near-unanimous choice to win the league, garnering 22-first place votes. A panel of 25 members of the WCHA media voted on a predicted order of finish, as well as individual awards.

Despite nearly everyone in the media selecting MSU to take first in the league, the disparity between the Mavericks (who earned 244 total points) and the second place team was just 26 points.

Ferris State earned two first place votes and 218 points for a solid second place finish. Alaska was picked to finish third with 168 points.

The teams in the middle of the pack were separated by 12 points. Bowling Green (149 points) was picked to finish fourth, followed by Michigan Tech (144) and Northern Michigan (137). Lake Superior State (117) was chosen to finish seventh, Bemidji State eighth (108) and Alaska Anchorage ninth (54). Alabama Huntsville, who was an independent last season, was picked to finish 10th out of 10 teams with 36 points.

The media also selected the league's Preseason Player and Rookie of the Year as well as an All-WCHA team. Minnesota State swept the Player and Rookie of the Year awards. MSU forward

Matt Leitner was the league media's near-unanimous pick for preseason Player of the Year while Mavericks' forward Zach Stepan was the media's pick for preseason Rookie of the Year.

WCHA Men's 2013-14 Composite Schedule Highlights

What could be one of the most highly-competitive seasons in the distinguished 62-year history of the men's Western Collegiate Hockey Association's commences in October as new league members Alabama Huntsville, Alaska, Bowling Green, Ferris State, Lake Superior State and Northern Michigan join Alaska Anchorage, Bemidji State, Michigan Tech and Minnesota State to compete for two of college hockey's most historic trophies – the MacNaughton Cup and the Broadmoor Trophy – and add to a seven-decade legacy that has seen a record 37 national championship teams come from this league.

On-ice competition launched the weekend of Oct. 4-6 with one two-game non-conference series featuring Ferris State traveling east to take on ECAC Hockey-member Colgate on Saturday and Sunday and seven other league teams engaged in exhibition play. Over the Oct. 11-12 weekend, all ten WCHA clubs will engage non-conference foes in two-game sets, with six of those series on the road. Alabama Huntsville will skate at Hockey East Association-member Northeastern, Minnesota State will play at Providence (HEA), Bowling Green will take on host Union (ECAC Hockey), Lake Superior will host Atlantic Hockey Association-member Robert Morris, Bemidji State heads to National College Hockey Conference-member St. Cloud State, Michigan



Tech ventures to Minnesota Duluth (NCHC), and Northern Michigan engages Big Ten Conference-member and host Wisconsin. Up in Anchorage, the UAA Seawolves will host their annual Kendall Hockey Classic, a four-team field that includes WCHA foe Alaska, Air Force (AHA) and Quinnipiac (ECAC Hockey).

The last full week of non-conference play prior to the opening of the league slate will occur Oct. 15-20. On Tuesday (Oct. 15), Ferris State travels to Mercyhurst (AHA) and Bowling Green hosts Ohio State (Big 10). On Friday and Saturday, Lake Superior competes at Union College (ECAC Hockey), Bowling Green hosts Colgate (ECAC Hockey), Northern Michigan welcomes Nebraska Omaha (NCHC), Ferris State entertains St. Lawrence (ECAC Hockey), Bemidji State hosts Minnesota (Big 10), Minnesota State takes on visiting Connecticut (AHA) and Alaska hosts their own Brice Alaska Goal Rush tournament which features WCHA-rival Alaska Anchorage, Denver (NCHC) and Western Michigan (NCHC) in addition to the Nanooks. On Friday and Sunday, Michigan Tech will skate at Notre Dame (HEA).

The heart of the 2013-14 WCHA men's composite schedule will be the season-long competition for the regular season championship and MacNaughton Cup. The 140-game conference schedule will continue the 28 games per team slate and feature all league series being played on the traditional college hockey nights of Fridays and Saturdays.

"We are extremely pleased with the 28 games per team schedule that will give our fans what they most want, and that's a majority of league games," said Commissioner McLeod.

The conference slate will have each of the 10 member teams playing 28 WCHA games, 14 at home and 14 away, with the regular season champion being awarded college hockey's most renowned and valuable trophy – the MacNaughton Cup. Each team will play five other league members four times each and four others two times each. The WCHA has had a 28 games per team conference schedule in place since 1997-98.

Conference play gets underway the weekend of Friday and Saturday, October 25-26, with a pair of two-game series as the league's newest member, Alabama Huntsville, hosts Bemidji State and a pair of Upper Peninsula and longtime rivals face-off when Northern Michigan entertains Michigan Tech.

On the weekend of November 1-2, five more WCHA teams engage in their first conference series of 2013-14 as Alaska plays host to Northern Michigan, Alaska Anchorage travels to Bowling Green, Ferris State visits Alabama Huntsville and Minnesota State heads to Bemidji State.

Then on November 8-9, Lake Superior skates in their 2013-14 WCHA opener when the Lakers entertain Alaska.

The first-half of WCHA play concludes the weekend of December 13-14 with second half conference action resuming just after New Year's on January 3-4.

During the course of the 2013-14 regular season there will be a total of four weekends featuring all 10 WCHA-member teams engaged in league play. Those are November 22-23, December 6-7, February 14-15 and March 7-8.

Additional non-conference schedule highlights in the first half of 2013-14 include: Oct. 25-26 – Mercyhurst (AHA) at Alaska; Oct. 29 – Bowling Green at Ohio State (Big 10); Nov. 1-2 – Michigan Tech at Michigan (Big 10), Lake Superior State at Wisconsin (Big 10); Nov. 8-9 – Michigan State (Big 10) at Michigan Tech; Nov. 9-10 – Northern Michigan at Western Michigan (NCHC); Nov. 15-16 – St. Cloud State (NCHC) at Alabama Huntsville,

Minnesota State at Minnesota (Big 10); Nov. 29-30 – Alabama Huntsville at Shillelagh Tournament in South Bend, IN (with Notre Dame/HEA, Northeastern/HEA and Western Michigan/NCHC), Miami (NCHC) at Bemidji State; Dec. 11 – Ferris State at Michigan (Big 10); Dec. 13-14 – Northern Michigan at North Dakota (NCHC); Dec. 14 – Ferris State at Michigan State (Big 10); and Dec. 27-28 – Bowling Green at Three Rivers Classic in Pittsburgh, PA (with Robert Morris/AHA, Boston College/HEA, Penn State/Big 10), Michigan Tech at Great Lakes Invitational at Comerica Park (outdoors) in Detroit, MI (with Michigan State/Big 10, Michigan/Big 10 and Western Michigan/NCHC), Alabama Huntsville at Wisconsin (Big 10).

During the second half, non-conference matchups include: Jan. 3-4 – Alaska Anchorage at Wisconsin (Big 10); Ferris State at the Mariucci Classic in Minneapolis, MN (with Minnesota, Colgate and Rensselaer); Jan. 10-11 – Alabama Huntsville at Notre Dame (HEA); Jan. 17-18 – Lake Superior State at Notre Dame (HEA), North Dakota (NCHC) at Bemidji State; Jan. 24-25 – Minnesota State at the North Star College Cup, Xcel Energy Center, St. Paul, MN (with Minnesota/Big 10, Minnesota Duluth/NCHC, St. Cloud State/NCHC).

The first round of WCHA playoffs for 2013-14 will be contested the weekend of March 14-16, a best-of-three series format that will feature the top eight finishers in regular season competition. The No. 1 seed will host the No. 8 seed, No. 2 will host No. 7, No. 3 will host No. 6 and No. 4 will host No. 5.

Following the first round, the four winners advance to the 2014 WCHA Final Five, March 21-22 at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids. The two semi-final matchups on Friday will feature the No. 3 seed vs the No. 2 seed at 2:07 pm ET and the No. 4 seed vs the No. 1 seed at 7:07 pm ET. On championship Saturday, the contest for the Broadmoor Trophy and the league's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament will face-off at 7:07 pm ET.

The 2014 NCAA Men's Div. 1 Hockey Championship will open the weekend of March 28-30 with four regionals. On Friday and Saturday, the NCAA East Regional will be held at Webster Bank Arena in Bridgeport (CT) while the NCAA Midwest Regional will be played at US Bank Arena in Cincinnati. On Saturday and Sunday, the NCAA Northeast Regional will be held at DCU Center in Worcester (MA) and the NCAA West Regional will be at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul.

The four regional winners then advance to the 2014 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, to be contested Thursday, April 10 and Saturday, April 12 at Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia, PA.

“The city of Grand Rapids, the West Michigan Sports Commission and Van Andel Arena all look forward to hosting the WCHA in 2014,” said Richard MacKeigan, Regional General Manager of Van Andel Arena. “Hockey in general and college hockey specifically is a passion for West Michigan and we look forward to working with the WCHA to share that passion with the players, coaches and fans. Along with the announcement of future championship sites, the league also unveiled both a new post-season playoff format for the 2013-14 season that features the top eight teams in the final regular season standings engaging in first-round, best-of-three playoff series at the home site of the top four finishers, followed by the four first-round winners advancing to the WCHA Final Five Playoff Championship the following weekend, which will consist of two semifinal games on the first day of the event followed by the Broadmoor Trophy title contest on day two. The dates of the 2014 WCHA Final Five at Van Andel Arena in Grand Rapids are March 21-22 (Friday/Saturday) with the return to Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul for the 2015 WCHA Playoff Championship set for March 20-21 (Friday/Saturday).

The WCHA Final Five will alternate between those two midwestern venues, with the new Big Ten Conference playing their post-season event at Xcel Energy Center every other year beginning in 2014. Xcel Energy Center has been home to the WCHA Final Five since 2001 and the WCHA has held a men’s post-season tournament annually since 1959-60, although in a number of different formats.

Van Andel Arena, located in the heart of Grand Rapids, is a 10,834-seat multi-purpose arena that opened in October of 1996 and has since attracted over five million patrons. It serves as the home of the popular Grand Rapids Griffins ice hockey team, the American Hockey League affiliate of the NHL’s Detroit Red Wings, and has hosted NCAA Men’s Ice Hockey Regionals in 1997, 2001, 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2009 in addition to numerous marquee concerts and shows. Van Andel Arena will also host the 2013 NCAA Men’s Hockey West Regional on March 29-30.

Xcel Energy Center, located in downtown Saint Paul, has a seating capacity of 17,954 and is home to the National Hockey

League’s Minnesota Wild and has hosted the men’s WCHA Final Five since 2001. Xcel Energy Center has also hosted the NCAA Men’s Frozen Four in 2002 and 2011 and NCAA Men’s Hockey Regional tournaments in 2010, 2012 and will again in 2014.

The men’s WCHA Playoff Championship has drawn 1,564,489 fans and averaged nearly 13,400 fans per game since 1988, when the league’s four-team final round was contested at the Saint Paul Civic Center between 1988-92. Beginning in 1993, the league went to a Final Five and for the next eight seasons and through 2000, was played at the Saint Paul Civic Center (1993, 1995, 1997), the Bradley Center in Milwaukee (1994, 1996, 1998) and Target Center (1999, 2000). Since moving into Xcel Energy Center for the 2001 WCHA Final Five, the league has consistently drawn some of college hockey’s biggest crowds for its championship, including a total of 923,566 fans over the past 12 years and an average of 15,393 fans per game.

Alabama Huntsville Chargers

- The Chargers will enter their first season in a conference since 2009, when they were a member of the CHA. The team was accepted into the new-look WCHA on Jan. 17.
- UAH named Mike Corbett the program's sixth head coach on July 8, 2013, after the departure of Kurt Kleinendorst to the AHL. Corbett comes to Huntsville from Air Force, where the program won five Atlantic Hockey titles while he served as assistant coach.
- The team returns its leading scorer from a season ago in Jeff Vanderlugt, who notched 10 points on the season and led the team in goals with seven.
- UAH will carry 11 freshmen on their 2013-14 roster, the most of any team in the WCHA.
- Matty Thomas is entering his first season at UAH as Assistant Coach, coming from perennial-power Denver. Thomas will join Gavin Morgan, who is entering his fourth season as assistant coach.
- Six of the team's first 10 games will be played at home in the Von Braun Center. The Chargers welcome long-time rival Bemidji State on Oct. 25.
- The program is pulling out all the marketing stops this season, with eight scheduled giveaways and kids get in free nights scheduled throughout the 2013-14 season.
- While UAH is very familiar with two WCHA foes in Bemidji State (70 games played) and Minnesota State (43 games played), the team has met the other seven conference schools a lowly combined 75 times.
- The Chargers were picked 10th by both the media and the coaches after winning just three games all of last season.
- The non-conference schedule is highlighted by a pair of visits to Notre Dame, including participation in the Shillelagh Tournament during Thanksgiving weekend, while UAH welcomes Frozen-Four member St. Cloud State to the VBC in mid-November.
- The team will return 17 letterwinners from a season ago, while saying goodbye to seven. In those seven were Kyle Lysaght (tied for team-lead in scoring), Curtis deBruyn (team captain) and Sebastian Geoffrion (Assistant Captain).
- UAH was outscored by almost three goals (4.1 to 1.4) per game last season, a number that has to be improved upon should the team be successful in the WCHA.

- The Alaska Anchorage Seawolves will commence their regular season this weekend with the 23rd annual Kendall Hockey Classic, Oct. 11-12 at the Sullivan Arena.
- Host Anchorage will face 2013 NCAA Men's Frozen Four runner-up and No. 10-ranked Quinnipiac on Friday, followed by Air Force on Saturday ... additionally, in-state rival Alaska will face both opponents prior to UAA's games.
- UAA, the two-time defending champion, is 22-14-11 all-time in the Classic and has furnished seven titles.
- The Seawolves – who are led by first-year head coach Matt Thomas – enter the weekend following a 2-1 exhibition win over University of British Columbia at the Wells Fargo Sports Complex last Friday (Oct. 4) ... UAA received goals from junior defenseman Austin Coldwell and freshman forward Dylan Hubbs ... freshman goaltender Michael Matyas (24 saves), who redshirted last season, dressed in his first collegiate game, collecting the win ... Matyas came up huge for UAA between the pipes, making multiple game-winning saves ... registering assists for the Seawolves was D Derek Docken, F Bobby Murphy, F Zack Rassel and D Blake Leask ... the Seawolves were 2-of-5 on the man-advantage, while keeping UBC scoreless on nine power-play attempts ... UAA out shot UBC, 28-25.

- Alaska cruised to an 8-1 victory Saturday night against the University of British Columbia in the team's final warm-up prior to the regular season.
- Senior center Cody Kunyk (Sherwood Park, AB) scored two goals to go with one assist while senior left wing Colton Beck (Langley, BC) had one score and two helpers in the exhibition win. Six others recorded multi-point nights in the win.
- Beck was named the team's captain for the 2013-14 season last Tuesday following practice while Kunyk, sophomore defenseman Colton Parayko (St. Albert, AB) and senior defenseman Michael Quinn (Surrey, BC) were tabbed assistant captains.
- Alaska is about to embark in its first season in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association after being a member of the now defunct Central Collegiate Hockey Association.
- Last season, the Nanooks finished 17-16-4 overall and were sixth in the CCHA standings with a 12-13-3-1 mark in league play. They fell in the opening round of the playoffs to Michigan State, losing the series two games to one.
- Alaska returns 18 players from last year's roster and adds eight rookies and one Division 1 transfer.
- Dallas Ferguson is entering his sixth year at the helm of his alma mater and is 80-81-28 during his tenure as the bench boss in Fairbanks.
- Following the Kendall in Anchorage, Alaska returns to Fairbanks to host the 2013 Brice Alaska Goal Rush at the Carlson Center, Oct. 18-19. Joining Alaska and UAA in the four-team tournament are No. 17/RV Denver and No. 18/RV Western Michigan, both of the National Collegiate Hockey Conference. DU was a former member of the WCHA with Anchorage while WMU was a former conference foe of Alaska in the CCHA.
- The Nanooks don't leave the Last Frontier until Nov. 8-9 when they face Lake Superior State in a pair of WCHA games. Following the two preseason tournaments, the Nanooks host Mercyhurst in a two-game series, Oct. 25-16, followed by the WCHA opener against Northern Michigan Nov. 1-2.



Bemidji State Beavers

- The Bemidji State University men's ice hockey team opens its 58th season Oct. 11-12 as it hits the road to battle long-time rival St. Cloud State. BSU holds a slight 44-42-4 edge in a series that dates back to 1948.
- In BSU's last two trips to the Herb Brooks National Hockey Center, BSU is 2-1-1 and has not been beaten on SCSU's home ice since a 6-3 loss to the Huskies Nov. 5, 2010.
- The Beavers have posted an impressive 41-14-2 mark in season openers and are unbeaten in 26 of their last 34 lid-lifters. Since making the jump to the NCAA Div. 1 ranks for the 1999-2000 season, BSU is 7-6-1 in season openers.
- Bemidji State finished the 2012-13 campaign 6-22-8 overall and 5-16-7 to finish 11th in the WCHA, playing 13 games vs teams ranked among the top 25. BSU's season came to an abrupt end at Minnesota in the first round of WCHA Playoffs. For a team that has averaged almost 17 wins per season and a winning percentage of nearly .650 over the last 57 years, its win total of six left the Beavers with their lowest win output since going 4-26-4 in 2000-01. However, records don't tell the entire story. Ten of the 22 losses were by one goal, including two in overtime.
- Tom Serratore, who is in his 13th season as BSU head coach, is 201-186-49 (.517). He is the dean of a coaching staff, which includes Bert Gilling and Ted Belisle, that has been intact for 11 seasons.
- Serratore opens 2013-14 with a roster featuring 10 players that don't have a single game of collegiate experience. BSU lost nine players to graduation at the end of the 2012-13 season. The senior class accounted for 39 goals (52%), 59 assists (48%) and 98 points last season – that's 49% of the team's scoring.
- Bemidji State will be captained in 2013-14 by junior defender Matt Prapavassis. Junior forward Jeff Jubinville and senior forward Matt Hartmann will wear the "A" this season.
- On a team that returns only 35 goals, sophomore forward Cory Ward opens 2013-14 as the team's top returning goal scorer. As a freshman he logged nine goals to sit tied for second place on the team while his 15 points (9g, 6a) placed him fifth.
- Junior Danny Mattson collected a career-high 15 assists in 2012-13 to lead the team in assists. His 19 points (4g, 15a) were third on the team and leave him as the top returning scorer. Of his 19 points, a team-high 10 (2g, 8a) came on the power-play.
- Junior Andrew Walsh opens the season as the primary goaltender. He finished his sophomore campaign 5-14-6 with a .916 save percentage and a 2.65 goals-against average. With 468 saves in 2012-13, only three WCHA goaltenders stopped more pucks a season ago.

Bowling Green Falcons

- Bowling Green State University concluded its 42nd season of intercollegiate hockey (2012-13) with a 15-21-5 record. The Falcons are 833-767-114 all-time.
- The Falcons defeated Lake Superior State in the first round of the CCHA Playoffs last year, marking it their third consecutive season they advanced to the second round.
- The Falcons scored exactly 100 goals last year, reaching the mark for the first time since the 2007-08 season, when they scored 106 in 40 games. Under head coach Chris Bergeron, the Orange and Brown have increased their goal scoring every season, scoring 74, 85 and 100 goals respectively.
- In BGSU history, the Falcons are 23-20-1 on opening day. The tie last year against Niagara marked the first time in history that Bowling Green tied an opponent on opening day, playing 43 openers before tying an opponent.
- Over the past 12 season-opening games, the Falcons have played an even six games at home and on the road. Bowling Green owns a record of 4-2 at home, while managing a 1-4-1 record on the road. In BGSU history, the Falcons are an impressive 18-7 at home in openers, while only coming away 5-13-1 on the road in 44 games.
 - Forward Ryan Carpenter led Bowling Green with 33 points last season, posting a team-high 18 goals and added 15 assists in 41 games played. It was the second consecutive season in which Carpenter reached the 30-point plateau, as he posted 11 goals and a team-high 19 assists in 44 games in the 2011-12 campaign.
 - Carpenter reached the 60-point milestone a year ago with 63 career points, leading all Falcons on the current roster. He is the first Falcon to pass the 60-point mark since David Solway in 2010-11.
 - Senior Cam Wojtala is just five points away from the 60 career points milestone with 55 career points, and junior defenseman Mike Sullivan is 10 away with 50 career points.
- The Orange and Brown are returning members that were responsible for 91 of the 100 goals a season ago, over 90%. The Falcons also return members that were responsible for 151 assists and 242 points, also over 90% of the team.
- Five freshmen hit the ice for Bowling Green this season. They are forwards Pierre-Luc Mercier, Kevin Dufour and Matt Pohlkamp, defenseman Sean Walker and goaltender Tomas Sholl.
- Four seniors wrapped up their collegiate careers last season in defensemen Ryan Peltoma (Brainerd, MN) and Robert Shea (Harrison Township, MI), forward Marc Rodriguez (Aurora, IL) and goaltender Andrew Hammond (Surrey, BC).



Ferris State Bulldogs

- Ferris State opened its 2013-14 season on the road with a 7-4, 0-1 non-league split vs Colgate in Hamilton, N.Y., last weekend. The Bulldogs exploded for seven goals from seven players in a 7-4 win in the opener on Oct. 5 as junior goaltender CJ Motte picked up the victory.
- FSU is back in action with a single non-league game against Mercyhurst on Tuesday, Oct. 15, in Erie, Pa., before returning home for the home-opening series vs St. Lawrence Oct. 18-19.
- FSU is a unanimous choice to finish second in its first season in the WCHA in both the 2013-14 Mankato Free Press WCHA Preseason Coaches Poll and the WCHA Preseason Media Poll.
- The Bulldogs embark on the school's first season in the WCHA in FSU's 36th year of Div. 1 hockey. This year's slate features eight home weekends with four new schools visiting Big Rapids for the first time.
- In 2012-13, FSU sold out five times and drew more than 2,000 fans for each of their last 10 home games in the 2400-seat facility. FSU has 11 sellouts at Ewingleben Ice Arena since the second half of a 2011-12 campaign that saw the Bulldogs reach the national championship game.
- Ferris State will help aid an important cause as part of home-opening weekend festivities by holding the school's first "Pink In The Rink" contest presented by General Mills-Yoplait. The Bulldogs will don pink jerseys for their 7:07 pm game on Oct. 19 vs St. Lawrence to help raise awareness and funds for the fight against breast cancer. Proceeds from the event will go to the local Susan P. Wheatlake Cancer & Wellness fund. The game is being made possible thru the generous support of General Mills-Yoplait, the exclusive sponsor for the contest.
- Senior forward Garrett Thompson registered 23 points (9g) in his last 28 outings a year ago after totaling three points in the initial 10 games.
- FSU was not ranked in the USCHO.com Div. 1 Preseason Poll, but was second among others receiving votes. The Bulldogs also earned votes in the USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine preseason poll. FSU was ranked for 37 consecutive weeks between the 2011-12 and 2012-13 seasons.
- FSU was second nationally in combined special teams (57.5%) in 2012-13, 15th in power-play (20.8%) and 12th in penalty-kill (85.8%).
- Junior goaltender CJ Motte tied for 16th in the country with three shutouts last year, was 15th nationally in save percentage (.927), and 18th in goals-against average (2.19). His .927 save percentage established a school single-season record a year ago.
- Senior defenseman Scott Czarnowczan is team captain for 2013-14.
- Bob Daniels, who was named the National Coach of the Year for the second time in 2011-12, embarks on his 22nd year behind the FSU bench in 2013-14 with a school-record 350 career victories.
- 20 letterwinners, including seven of the top 10 points leaders, return in 2013-14. The Bulldogs lost five seniors, including captain and leading scorer Kyle Bonis, but FSU did ink a talented incoming recruiting class featuring seven newcomers.
- More than 20 former FSU skaters signed new pro contracts in the offseason. A year ago, three Bulldogs saw action in the NHL, including NHL First Team All-Star Chris Kunitz (Penguins), Zach Redmond (Jets) and Greg Rallo (Panthers). Meanwhile, former captain Chad Billins helped lead Grand Rapids to the AHL's Calder Cup championship under coach Jeff Blashill, who is a Bulldog alum and former assistant coach.

Lake Superior State Lakers

- The Lakers play host to Atlantic Hockey's Robert Morris for the first time since 2008-09 season, when LSSU split, winning 3-1 and losing 4-3. Overall, LSSU leads the all-time series against the Colonials 5-1-0, with a 3-1-0 home record.
 - The Lakers return two of their top four point grabbers from the 2012-13 season. Senior forward Dan Radke, with 5-16=21, and junior forward Chris Ciotti, with 11-8=19, had a combined 40 points for LSSU. Ciotti was second for the Lakers in goals with 11, while Radke was second in assists with 16.
 - Radke tallied two goals for the Lakers during this past Sunday's 3-2 exhibition loss to the U.S. National Team Development Program's Under-18 Team. Senior forward Colin Campbell collected two assists, while senior defenseman Zach Sternberg tallied one assist.
 - On the defensive end, LSSU is led by senior goaltenders Kevin Kapalka and Kevin Murdock, and senior defensemen Andrew Perrault, Matt Bruneteau and Sternberg. Murdock ranked third in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association in save percentage last season, while Sternberg was eighth in defenseman scoring with 5-14=19. Bruneteau and Perrault have been noted for their shot-blocking prowess.
 - The Lakers will honor Laker Hockey parents with their annual Parents Weekend festivities this weekend. LSSU will also celebrate the 25th anniversary of the 1988 Laker team, who won the program's first NCAA hockey title.
- The last time LSSU faced Robert Morris was during the 2009-10 season, when the Lakers swept the series in Pittsburgh, Pa., 7-6 and 2-0.
- LSSU opens Western Collegiate Hockey Association play Nov. 8-9, when the Lakers host Alaska. During that series, LSSU will celebrate Great Lake State Weekend and its sixth annual Pink in the Rink.
 - Will Acton, a forward for LSSU from 2007-11, tallied his first career NHL point for the Edmonton Oilers last week. On Oct. 1, Acton earned the lone assist on the Oilers' first goal of the 5-4 loss to the Winnipeg Jets.



Michigan Tech Huskies

- Michigan Tech will open its 92nd season of hockey on Friday (Oct. 11) at Minnesota Duluth. The Huskies have won 1,127 games in program history.
- Sophomore Alex Petan scored a hat trick in Tech's season-opening exhibition game for the second straight year. The Delta, BC, native tallied one goal in the second period and two more in the third to lift the Huskies to a 3-2 win over Laurentian on Oct. 5. Petan had a hat trick vs. Brock in last year's exhibition game before going on to a strong season in which he earned All-WCHA Rookie Team honors.
- Head coach Mel Pearson enters his third season behind the Tech bench in 2013-14. The 2011-12 WCHA Coach of the Year owns a 29-39-8 overall record in his first two seasons in Houghton.
- Tech put 59 shots on goal in its exhibition game vs Laurentian. The Huskies took 18 in the first period, 20 in the second and 21 in the third.
- Michigan Tech has 29 players on its roster for 2013-14: 17 forwards, nine defensemen and three goaltenders.
- The Huskies will have co-captains this season in senior defenseman Brad Stebner (Fort McMurray, AB) and junior forward Blake Pietila (Brighton, MI). Assistant captains will be senior forward Dennis Rix (Grande Prairie, AB) and junior forward Tanner Kero (Hancock, MI)
- Tech begins its 2013-14 campaign with five consecutive road games before hosting Northern Michigan on Oct. 26. In all, the Huskies have seven of their first eight contests on the road and 22 of their 38 regular season games away from the John MacInnes Student Ice Arena.
- MTU drew 3,303 fans to its exhibition game last Saturday. The Huskies average attendance has improved 32% over the last two seasons.
- Returning forwards from a year ago combined for 222 points – or 78% of Tech's offense. Alex Petan was the team leader in scoring with 15-19=34. Four other returning forwards had at least 20 points last season in David Johnstone (10-19=29), Tanner Kero (11-13=24), Blake Pietila (14-10=24) and Ryan Furne (6-14=20).
- Coach Pearson is expecting big contributions from his freshman class, which includes five forwards, three defensemen and a goaltender. Beginning with the forwards, Brent Baltus was the Interior MVP of the BCHL in 2013 with 24-28=52. Mike Neville, team captain of the Ontario Junior Hockey League champion St. Michael's Buzzers, had 51 points in 44 games. Tyler Heinonen is coming off a 48-point season in the USHL. Reid Sturos had a successful season with Nanaimo of the BCHL, being named team MVP with 25-32=57 in 56 games. Defensively, Cliff Watson is a San Jose (NHL) draft choice who played the last two seasons with Sioux City of the USHL. Watson tallied 11 points and a +10 rating in 62 games. Shane Hanna was the highest-scoring blue liner in the BCHL in 2012-13 when he posted 12-39=51 for the Salmon Arm Silverbacks. The BCHL Interior First Team All-Star is expected to make immediate contributions on Tech's power-play. Chris Leibinger is a veteran of the USHL who started last season with Muskegon and finished in Waterloo. The rookie goaltender is Matt Wintjes (Landing, ON), who played the last four seasons for Newmarket of the OJHL. He appeared in 35 games in 2012-13 with a 2.31 goals-against average and .915 save percentage, helping his team to game seven of the OJHL finals.

Minnesota State Mavericks

- Minnesota State opened up 2013-14 with a 7-1 exhibition win over Lethbridge this past Sunday. Sophomore forward Teddy Blueger had a goal and three assists and senior forward Johnny McInnis contributed a goal and two helpers in the victory.
- The Mavericks, who went 24-14-3 last year, officially open the season with a pair of non-conference road games at Providence this Friday and Saturday. The Mavericks are 0-4-0 in the all-time series with the Friars. MSU last played Providence in 2003-04 in a two-game series played in Mankato (2-1 and 5-3 losses).
- Minnesota State stands 20-20-4 all-time in season-opening games.
- This marks the 45th season for Minnesota State men's hockey and the Mavericks enter the year owning an all-time record of 760-587-137 (.558). MSU is in its 17th season of NCAA Division 1 competition.
- Minnesota State was rated #11 in the uscho.com preseason poll and #14 in the USA Today/USA Hockey preseason poll.
- Serving as team captain for the Mavericks in 2013-14 is senior forward Johnny McInnis. Senior defenseman Josh Nelson and junior defenseman Brett Stern are serving as alternate captains.
- A total of 11 returning Mavericks saw action in all 41 games last season and junior forwards Jean-Paul Lafontaine and Matt Leitner, along with junior defenseman Zach Palmquist, are MSU's active leaders in terms of consecutive games played at 79. The three-year trio have not missed a game during their times as Mavericks.
- Mike Hastings enjoyed an outstanding first year behind the bench as head coach of the Mavericks in 2013-14 in guiding Minnesota State to a 24-14-3 mark and a 16-11-1 mark in league play. Named the 2012-13 WCHA Coach of the Year, the Crookston, Minn., native led MSU to a first-round WCHA playoff series win over Nebraska Omaha, an appearance at the WCHA Final Five and an invitation to the NCAA postseason tournament.
- The youngest player on this year's roster (for the second consecutive season) is sophomore forward Teddy Blueger (born Aug. 15, 1994). The oldest Maverick is senior goaltender Evan Karambelas (born Jan. 28, 1989).
- Selected as the WCHA preseason Player of the Year by the coaches and the media, Minnesota State junior forward Matt Leitner finished last year with 17 goals and 30 assists for 47 points. The Los Alamitos, Calif., native ranked ninth overall in the country in points and tenth in assists in 2013-14.

- For the third season in a row, the Wildcats open the season with a non-conference series against the Wisconsin Badgers. The two teams split in the 2011-12 opener at the Kohl Center with NMU winning Friday 3-2 (ot) and then falling 3-2 on Saturday. Last season at the Resch Center in Green Bay, the Wildcats swept the Badgers with a 2-1 win Friday and a 4-2 win on Saturday.
- Wisconsin leads the all-time series vs NMU, 45-27-6. NMU is 12-31-0 in away games against the Badgers. The series started in the 1981 Frozen Four.
- NMU is unbeaten in six of the last seven meetings with Wisconsin and has won five of the last six games.
- NMU defeated the USA Under-18 Team 3-1 last Friday and Laurentian University 3-2 last Saturday in a pair of exhibition games at the Berry Events Center. The 'Cats came from behind in both games.
- Sophomore forward Cohen Adair had a goal and an assist in the 3-1 win over the USA Under-18 team on Friday.
- Junior forward Ryan Daugherty had three points in the two Oct. 5-6 exhibition games. He had an assist last Saturday and scored a pair of goals Sunday. Daugherty scored the game-tying and game-winning goals Saturday, including a shorthanded tally.
- Redshirt freshman goaltender Mathias Dahlstrom had 28 saves in the two wins over the weekend. He played the first and second periods on Oct. 5 and the third on Oct. 6. Sophomore Michael Doan had 20 saves on the weekend and played the third last Saturday and the first two periods on Sunday.
- Walt Kyle marks his 12th season as the head coach of the Wildcats. His all-time record is 208-186-49. The 200th career win was on Jan. 4, 2012 in a 6-2 victory at St. Cloud State. Kyle is one of 10 college hockey coaches with NHL coaching experience and one of 25 who are coaching at their alma mater. Forty-two percent of the 59 NCAA Div. 1 coaches are leading the program they played for.
- Senior defenseman CJ Ludwig is the team captain with junior forward Reed Seckel, senior forward Stephan Vigier and junior defenseman Luke Eibler as the assistants. Seckel will wear the A at all games. Eibler will wear the A on the road. Vigier will wear the A at home.
- Other non-conference games for NMU after the Wisconsin series are at home against Nebraska Omaha (Oct. 18-19) at Western Michigan (Nov. 9-10) and at North Dakota (Dec. 13-14).
- NMU is the fourth oldest team in college hockey this season. The average age of the Wildcats is 22 years and 129 days.
