to Minnesota while Michigan Tech will entertain Minnesota State. Face-offs Friday and Saturday at both Mariucci Arena (10,000) in Minneapolis and John MacInnes Student Ice Arena (4,128) in Houghton are set for 7:07 pm CT.

Michigan Tech also gets this week started with a Tuesday (Oct. 12) evening non-conference matchup against Upper Peninsula-rival Northern Michigan in Houghton while the six other league-member teams – Alaska Anchorage, Colorado College, Denver, Minnesota Duluth, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin – will all be engaged in non-conference action. On Friday and Saturday, the Seawolves will join Colorado College, Union and host Alaska for the Brice Alaska Goal Rush tourney in Fairbanks, Denver will host defending national champion Boston College at Magness Arena (6,026), Minnesota Duluth will host Providence College at the DECC (5,303), and St. Cloud State welcomes Miami to the National Hockey Center (5,371). Wisconsin, meanwhile, will host Alabama-Huntsville in a Friday-Sunday series at the Kohl Center (15,237).

WCHA-member teams combined for a sparkling 13-2-5 record and .763 winning percentage in 20 non-conference games over the 2010-11 regular season opening weekend of Oct. 8-10. At the Kendall Hockey Classic in Anchorage, host Alaska Anchorage skated to a 5-5 (ot) tie against North Dakota and a 3-2 victory over Air Force while the Sioux prevailed in a shootout vs UAA and then downed Alaska 3-1 to capture the tourney title. Colorado College won (2-1) and tied (2-2 ot) against visiting Rensselaer, Denver won (5-3) and tied (1-1 ot) at Vermont, Michigan Tech won 4-3 (ot) at Northern Michigan and 6-2 at Lake Superior State and Minnesota posted a 5-3, 5-4 home-ice sweep over Massachusetts. Minnesota Duluth went on the road on Oct. 8-9 to fashion a 6-6 (ot) tie at Lake Superior State

St. Cloud State, also a participant in the Maverick Stampede, downed RIT 3-1 last Friday before falling 6-2 to Clarkson on Saturday while Wisconsin fell 4-3 to Boston University on Oct. 8 and then blanked Holy Cross 6-0 on Sunday (Oct. 10) at the Ice Breaker Tournament held at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Mo.

Looking ahead to the weekend of Friday and Saturday, Oct. 22-23, there will be four WCHA series on the docket as Alaska Anchorage heads to Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota hosts St. Cloud State, Colorado College travels to Minnesota State and Denver entertains Wisconsin. In non-conference action, Nebraska Omaha heads to Michigan while North Dakota visits Maine. Both Bemidji State and Michigan Tech will be idle.

## 2010-11 WCHA Men's Schedule Highlights

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, marking its 59th season of on-ice competition and owning a record 36 NCAA Men's Frozen Four titles since its founding in 1951, released its 2010-11 men's composite schedule in mid-August, highlighted by the addition of new league member teams Bemidji State University and the University of Nebraska at Omaha, a new format for the highly-successful Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, and the appearance of both the Final Five and the 2011 NCAA Men's Frozen Four at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn.

In addition, league members Bemidji State and the University of Minnesota Duluth will unveil new arenas this season while Michigan Technological University will serve as host school for both the 2011 (and 2012) NCAA Midwest Regionals at Resch Center in Green Bay, Wis. Bemidji State will open the Robert H. Peters Rink at the Bemidji Regional Event Center on Oct. 15 vs North Dakota while Minnesota Duluth will open the new AMSOIL Arena in Duluth against the Sioux on Dec. 30 in the non-conference U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game.

"It's going to be a tremendously exciting season ... no doubt about it," said WCHA Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod. "The addition of Bemidji State and Nebraska at Omaha are going to make an already great WCHA even better. If you thought we were good at 10 teams just wait until you see us at 12.

"We are also looking forward with great enthusiasm and anticipation to our new-look Red Baron WCHA Final Five at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul," added McLeod. "Having six first round playoff series, bringing those six winning teams to the Final Five, and also the addition of an NHL game featuring the Minnesota Wild on our championship Saturday gives us a real shot in the arm. We could not be more pleased with how things have turned out."

Under Commissioner McLeod, who has built a thriving partnership between the WCHA, Xcel Energy Center and the NHL's Minnesota Wild, the annual Red Baron WCHA Final Five has developed into college hockey's most prosperous conference tournament.

The 2011 edition of the Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five will mark the event's 11th consecutive season at Xcel Energy Center, where the playoff championship has drawn 792,791 fans in 10 previous appearances – an average of 79,279 per tournament and an average crowd of 15,856 per game.

"The Association is extremely fortunate to have such a special relationship with both Xcel Energy Center, the Minnesota Wild, and the City of Saint Paul" said McLeod. "Our on-going success has been a direct result of this close relationship and we owe a debt of gratitude to Xcel Energy Center Vice-President and General Manager Jack Larson and his staff, Minnesota Wild Owner and Governor Craig Leopold, former Owner Bob Naegele, Jr., and Vice-President for Communications and Broadcasting Bill Robertson and their staffs. They have been a fixture throughout what is an unparalleled decade of success for the Association and the Final Five. We couldn't be more excited about this unique partnership."

"Another part of our success in marketing the Final Five has been our decade-long exclusive television partnership with Fox Sports North and our many sponsors. We want to take this time to thank Mike Diamond and his staff at FS North and to also sincerely thank Red Baron® as our on-going Final Five title sponsor."

The 2010-11 campaign will be a historic one for the WCHA, as it marks the expansion of the league from 10 to 12 member teams. On June 26, 2009, the WCHA membership voted to admit both Bemidji State and Nebraska at Omaha into the Association family.

The first regular season action, all non-conference matchups, will occur Oct. 8-10. Denver opens at Vermont, Minnesota Duluth and Michigan Tech alternate at Lake Superior State and Northern Michigan in the Superior Showcase, Minnesota hosts Massachusetts, Minnesota State entertains St. Lawrence, Nebraska at Omaha hosts St. Cloud State, RIT and Clarkson in the Mutual of Omaha Stampede, Alaska Anchorage hosts North Dakota, Air Force and Alaska Fairbanks in the Kendall Hockey Classic, Wisconsin joins Holy Cross, Notre Dame and Boston University at the Ice Breaker

Tournament in St. Louis (Saturday/Sunday), and Colorado College hosts Rensselaer.

The race for the WCHA regular season championship, a 168-game schedule which consists of 28 league games for each of the 12 teams, will get underway Oct. 15-16 with new members Bemidji State and Nebraska at Omaha both playing their first league series. The Beavers will entertain North Dakota and the Mavericks will travel to Minnesota while Michigan Tech plays host to Minnesota State. Other WCHA series openers, by member team, are: Alaska Anchorage (Oct. 22-23 at Minnesota Duluth), Colorado College (Oct. 22-23 at Minnesota State), defending WCHA champion Denver (Oct. 22-23 vs Wisconsin), Minnesota Duluth (Oct. 22-23 vs Alaska Anchorage), St. Cloud State (Oct. 22-23 at Minnesota), and Wisconsin (Oct. 22-23 at Denver). During the course of the 168-game conference schedule there will be eight weekends featuring all league play – Nov. 5-6 (UAA and MTU are idle), Nov. 19-20 (CC and MSU are idle), Dec. 3-4, Dec. 9-11, Feb. 4-5 (UND and UW are idle), Feb. 11-12, Feb. 18-19 and March 4-5.

(Dec. 29-30), Michigan Tech hosting and CC playing in the Great Lakes Invitational in Detroit (Dec. 29-30), Minnesota hosting and Bemidji State playing in the Dodge Holiday Classic (Dec. 31-Jan. 1), and Minnesota State playing in the Shillelagh Tournament in Hoffman Estates, Ill. (Jan. 1-2).

Beginning in 2010-11 the WCHA post-season championship will consist of six first round, best-of-three series on campus sites. **History of the Broadmoor Trophy:** One of the WCHA's two major championship trophies is the statuesque and highly sought-after Broadmoor Trophy, which has been awarded annually since 1985 to the winner of the conference's post season playoff championship tournament.

The Broadmoor Trophy itself dates to 1981 when it was first presented to the conference by the world-renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort Complex of Colorado Springs. For the first three seasons of its partnership with the WCHA (1981-1984) – and due to the departure of league member and MacNaughton Cup (regular season championship trophy) custodian Michigan Tech to the CCHA – the Broadmoor Trophy was presented to the Association's regular season champion. But when the Huskies returned to the WCHA in 1984 – with the MacNaughton Cup in hand – the Broadmoor Trophy became, and has remained since, the symbol of the league's post-season tournament championship.

Long an ardent supporter of college hockey, the Broadmoor Hotel included the former Broadmoor World Arena, which hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship a total of 11 times between 1948 and 1969.



# WCHA Men's Member Team Weekly Notebooks

## Alaska Anchorage Seawolves

- Alaska Anchorage will head north to face WCHA member Colorado College in non-conference action on Oct. 15 and Union College on Oct. 16 in the third annual Brice Alaska Goal Rush tournament. The Seawolves are 3-1 in the BAGR and are looking for their second title since winning the inaugural tournament in 2008 with wins over Maine and Mercyhurst. Last season UAA defeated RPI (3-0), before falling to Robert Morris (3-5).
- Colorado College holds the all-time series winning record over UAA at 50-14-3. The teams met for two series last season for a 2-2 tie. UAA won both Saturday night contests. The meeting between UAA and Union College will be the first ever.
- Last weekend the Seawolves opened up the regular season hosting the 20th edition of the Kendall Hockey Classic. On Oct. 8, UAA tied No. 2 North Dakota in overtime, 5-5. For the purpose of determining a tournament champion, the game went into a best-of-3 shootout, with the Fighting Sioux prevailing, 2-1. The Seawolves also saw UND for a series last season (Oct. 23-24) when they were ranked No. 2. UND won 5-0 on Friday, followed by a 2-1 UAA win on Saturday.
- On Oct. 9, the Seawolves faced Air Force for the first time since the 2003-04 season and defeated the Falcons, 3-2. Earlier that night, the Sioux defeated Alaska Fairbanks, there by claiming the title – their first appearance and championship since the inaugural title in 1984.
- UND holds the all-time record over the Seawolves, 41-18-4, while UAA leads AFA 13-5-1. UAA is now 20-14-8 in the Classic.
- Following the tournament, UAA holds a 1-0-1 record – the third time under head coach Dave Shyaiak. Shyaiak led UAA to the same opening record in 2006-07 and 2007-08.
- Throughout the tournament, UAA allowed two power-play tallies – both against North Dakota. The Seawolves were tagged for 9 penalties, serving 19 minutes – considerably low for UAA after two games. UAA was unsuccessful on the man advantage (0-5).
- Representing the Seawolves on the all-tournament team was senior forwards Tommy Grant and Sean Wiles. Wiles registered a three-goal weekend, including the game-winner against Air Force and a shorthanded goal against North Dakota. Grant netted one goal and two assists. Both lead UAA with three points apiece.
- Grant will be looking for his 100th-career game on Oct. 15 against Colorado College. Grant is second among current UAA skaters – senior F Craig Parkinson leads with 102 career games under his belt.
- Finding the back of the net for the first time of their career was rookies F Brett Cameron (1-1=2), F Matt Bailey (1-1=2) and F Jordan Kwas (0-2=2). Cameron recorded the game-tying goal against UND.
- Overall, seven Seawolves registered a multi-point weekend. UAA posted 20 points over the course of two games and allowed 17 points. Posting multi-point games was Grant, sophomore F Mitch Bruijsten, Bailey, Cameron and Wiles.
- Making their college debuts in net was freshmen Chris Kamal and Rob Gunderson. Kamal logged his first minutes against North Dakota on made 25 saves for a .833sv% in 65 minutes of game time. Gunderson stopped 28 shots for a .933sv% in 60 minutes of play.
- The following weekend UAA will open conference play when they head to Minnesota Duluth on Oct. 22-23.

## Bemidji State Beavers

- In the 55 seasons since Bemidji State University first fielded a collegiate ice hockey team, few have come with the build up and anticipation of the 2010-11 campaign. Not only are the Beavers celebrating the completion of their new \$90 state-of-the-art hockey home, they also open play as members of America's premier collegiate hockey league – the Western Collegiate Hockey Association.
- With all that is on the line this weekend, it only seems fitting that the Beavers host the nationally-ranked Fighting Sioux, preseason WCHA favorites, for their season-opening series. A closer look shows the teams have far more in common than school colors. Each team has assembled a tradition-rich history brimming with championships and now, while R.H. "Bob" Peters, the cornerstone of Bemidji State's dynasty, is a graduate of UND and served as its head coach in 1965 before taking the reigns of the BSU program. Moreover, with just over 100 miles separating the cities of Grand Forks, N.D. and Bemidji, the rivalry is natural.
- The 2010-11 season-opening series between the Beavers and Fighting Sioux marks a continuation of a series that has roots extending back to the early 1970s after a one-year hiatus. Since the first meeting between the teams Feb. 6, 1970, UND has built a 17-1-1 advantage, including a perfect 5-0-0 mark when facing BSU in Bemidji. Earning their only win vs UND on Feb. 7, 1970 (7-5), the Beavers

enter the weekend in search of their first victory over the Sioux since Bemidji State made the jump to the major college hockey level prior to the 1999-2000 season – a stretch during which BSU is 0-14-1 vs North Dakota.

- Despite UND's dominance in the series, eight of the last 11 contests have resulted in a Sioux margin of victory of a goal, which includes UND's last three trips to Bemidji.

## Colorado College Tigers

- Last week's victory and tie against RPI allowed Colorado College to remain undefeated (4-0-1) in five all-time meetings with the Engineers.
- Last Friday's 2-1 triumph gave Scott Owens an 11-1 ledger in season openers during his 12-year reign as head coach at CC. The only blemish on that record is a 6-2 loss at North Dakota to start the 2001-02 campaign – the only time that the Tigers have opened on the road during Owens' tenure. He's now a perfect 12-0 in home openers.
- Sophomore center Rylan Schwartz, who also scored in last Saturday's 2-2 tie, struck for the game-winning goal during a CC power-play midway through the third period of Friday's contest. Of his eight career tallies, four have been GWGs. Schwartz factored in on 10 game-winners as a freshman in 2009-10, scoring three and assisting on seven.
- Freshman left wing Jaden Schwartz, one of five Tiger rookies to make their collegiate debuts last weekend, factored in on three (1g,2a) of Colorado College's four goals against RPI. He helped set up his older brother's GWG on Friday.
- After converting on two of eight power-play opportunities in Friday's series opener, CC went 0-for-7 with the man-advantage after grabbing a 2-0 first-period lead in Saturday's 2-2 tie.
- Of the 26 players on Colorado College's roster, 16 are either freshmen or sophomores.
- Junior defenseman Gabe Guentzel, who assisted on both Tiger goals in last Friday's victory, now has collected 26 (5g,21a) of his 41 career points (6g,35a) on the power-play.
- Sophomore goaltender Joe Howe, who joined Rylan Schwartz on the All-WCHA Rookie Team as a freshman last season, now owns a career record of 18-15-4 (.541) after playing both games last weekend.
- Including 17 exhibition games, the Tigers now are 197-76-13 (.712) in 286 all-time appearances at the Colorado Springs World Arena since opening the facility in January 1998.

## Denver Pioneers

- Denver (1-0-1) hosts defending NCAA champion Boston College (1-0-0) during Homecoming and Hall of Fame Weekend on Oct. 15-16 at Magness Arena.
- The games will be telecast on FSN Rocky Mountain (Oct. 15) and Pioneer Vision at DenverPioneers.com (Oct. 16).
- DU holds a 13-9 advantage over Boston College in the series that started in 1968, including a dramatic 4-3 win for the Denver Cup Classic championship last season.
- Denver is 6-7-1 against top ranked teams since 2004-05.
- DU won (5-3) and tied (1-1 ot) at Vermont last weekend (Oct. 8-9).
- Drew Shore netted a career-high two goals in the 5-3 win and Denver's lone goal in the overtime tie. Shore leads DU in scoring with 3-0=3.
- Matt Donovan tallied a career-best two goals in the win and leads DU blueliners with 2-0=2.
- Sophomore Adam Murray (1-0-0, 3.00 GAA, .900 Sv%) earned the win at Vermont with 28 saves, while freshman Sam Brittain (0-0-1, 0.92 GAA, .966 Sv%) earned the tie with 27 saves.
- DU is 1-for-4 (25%) on the power-play and 9-for-10 (90%) on the penalty-kill.

### Michigan Tech Huskies

- Michigan Tech will host a trio of games this week. Tech welcomes rival Northern Michigan to Houghton Tuesday before opening WCHA play at home against Minnesota State Friday and Saturday.
- Tech posted a dramatic 4-3 overtime win at Northern Michigan to open the season. Tech followed up with a 6-2 win at Lake Superior State to win the Superior Showcase. The six goals was the most scored by Tech since a 6-5 overtime win vs. Minnesota on March 6, 2009. The weekend sweep was the first for the Huskies since a sweep of Mercyhurst on Jan. 4-5, 2008.
- Tech currently ranks fourth in the nation in scoring offense (5.0 gpg).
- The Huskies had 12 different players record at least one point in the series, with seven recording multiple. Senior Bennett Royer led the team with four points (2g, 2a) on the weekend including the game-winning goal in overtime against NMU. He currently ranks tied for sixth in the WCHA in points. Sophomore Steven Seigo is tied for the league lead in points with three (1g, 2a). Senior Eric Kattelus' three assists currently rank tied for fourth in the league. Freshman Daniel Holmberg scored one goal and added one assist on the weekend and ranks tied for fifth in the league in freshman scoring.
- Special teams also excelled on the weekend. Tech finished 3-of-7 on the power-play over the weekend and ranks fourth in the nation and second in the league on the man-advantage. The penalty-kill finished the weekend 4-of-5.
- After this weekend's WCHA series vs Minnesota State, Michigan Tech will have the next weekend off.

### Minnesota Golden Gophers

- **Won and Done:** Minnesota began the 2010-11 season with a sweep of Massachusetts of Hockey East. The Gophers won 5-3 on Friday and 5-4 on Saturday and do not play another regular-season game against a Hockey East opponent this season. Minnesota is 2-0-0 for the first time since 2008 when it took both games of a home-and-home series against St. Cloud State to begin the year. The Gophers are 2-0-0 for the sixth time in coach Don Lucia's tenure.
- **Against Hockey East:** After sweeping Massachusetts, the Golden Gophers are now 80-47-7 all-time against teams from Hockey East and 3-0-0 versus the Minutemen. Prior to this weekend, the Gophers lone win against Massachusetts came at the 2004 Nye Frontier Classic in Anchorage, Alaska. Minnesota won that game 1-0 after a last-minute goal from Ryan Potulny. Minnesota has played every team in Hockey East at least nine times except for Massachusetts and Merrimack. The Gophers have now played Massachusetts three times, but have only played Merrimack once.
- **Opening Under Lucia:** After a season-opening win on Friday against Massachusetts, the Gophers are now 7-5-0 in season-opening games under coach Don Lucia. That record improves to 8-3-1 for home openers at Mariucci Arena. Friday was the first time since 2005 that the Gophers opened the season at Mariucci Arena. (2006 and 2007 at Xcel Energy Center; 2008 at St. Cloud State; 2009 at North Dakota).
- **Call Him Captain:** There may not be a better story in college hockey than the one that belongs to senior captain Jay Barriball. The 23-year-old has battled injuries during his entire career and missed all but five games last year because of a significant knee injury suffered in practice on Nov. 3, 2009. Before the injury he had two goals and two assists in what was supposed to be his senior season. Barriball was granted a medical redshirt by the NCAA and began the year in grand fashion. He scored Minnesota's first goal in both games against Massachusetts and had a hat trick in the first period on Saturday. Barriball was the first Gopher to pot three goals in the same game since Blake Wheeler did so in a 4-2 win against Wisconsin on March, 16, 2007. Barriball, who became the 78th player in school history to reach 100 career points last year, now has 107 points (43g-64a) in 126 games.
- **Fresh Import:** Freshman Erik Haula, who hails from Pori, Finland, became the first European-born player to pull on the M sweater for the Gophers since Thomas Vanek (Graz, Austria) in 2003-2004. Haula and Vanek are the only Europeans to play for Minnesota under coach Don Lucia. Haula, who was drafted by the Minnesota Wild in the seventh round of the 2009 NHL Entry Draft, centered the top line over the weekend. Haula was flanked by seniors Jay Barriball and Mike Hoeffel and assisted on four of the 10 goals that the Gophers scored against Massachusetts.
- **Kangas Moving Up:** Senior Alex Kangas entered his senior season third all-time in program history with 2,571 saves. The 23-year-old played Friday against Massachusetts and recorded 29 saves in a 5-3 win. He now has 2,600 saves for his career and is only the third Gopher to reach that mark. Kangas should move into second all-time on the career saves list this season. Kellen Briggs (2,968 saves) and

Adam Hauser (3,777 saves) are the only players ahead of him.

- **Let'em Play:** Senior Jacob Cepis, a transfer from Bowling Green, is playing in his first full season with Minnesota this year. He missed the first half of the season a year ago because of NCAA transfer regulations. He joined the lineup at mid-season a year ago and has averaged nearly a point a game since. He had 19 points (7g-12a) in 21 games a year ago en route to receiving the team's Unsung Hero award and has picked up this year where he left off last year. Cepis had an assist on Friday and a goal and a helper on Saturday. He now has 22 points in 23 career games.
- **Give Me Ten:** The Gophers scored a combined 10 goals in their weekend sweep of Massachusetts, tallying five each in both games. It took Minnesota XX games to reach 10 goals last year. The last time the Gophers scored a combined 10 goals in their first two games was the 2002-03 season when they opened the year with a 7-2 win against Ohio State and then tied New Hampshire 5-5.
- **Growing Up:** The Gophers began their 90th season of play last Friday against Massachusetts. Sophomore defenseman Seth Helgeson turned 20 the same day. Helgeson, who celebrated his birthday by scoring the second goal of his career, is the 20th player on Minnesota's roster who is 20 or older. The Gophers may have ten freshmen, but that does not mean they are not an experienced team – over half of the players on the roster are 21 or older and the team's average age is 20.6. The oldest player on the team is 23-year-old Jay Barriball, who is one day older than netminder Alex Kangas. The youngest player on the team is freshman Nick Bjugstad, who was only 17 when he graduated from high school in the spring and turned 18 in July.
- **No Longer In Style:** A year ago Minnesota was 16-1-0 when allowing two goals or less and 2-18-1 when allowing three or more goals. This year, the Gophers are already 2-0-0 when allowing three or more goals. Minnesota allowed three goals on Friday to Massachusetts and four on Saturday.

### Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs

- UMD will make its 2010-11 home debuts – the final it will do so at the DECC – this Friday and Saturday when it hosts Providence College in a pair of non-conference clashes. The two clubs have not collided since Nov. 11, 1998.
- The Bulldogs will play their first eight home games of the year at the DECC before christening the new \$70 million, 6,732-seat AMSOIL Arena on Dec. 30 against North Dakota in the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game. The DECC has served as UMD's hockey home since the 1966-67 season. Over those 44 seasons, the Bulldogs have compiled a 452-351-51 record (.559 winning percentage) and are 24-12-3 (.654) since the start of 2008-09.
- UMD launched its 67th year of intercollegiate hockey by going 1-0-1 against a pair of Central Collegiate Hockey Association opponents last weekend as part of the fourth annual Superior Cup series. UMD followed up a 6-6 overtime tie at Lake Superior State last Friday by nipping Northern Michigan 3-2 the next evening in Marquette. Michigan Tech won the 2010 Superior Cup by posting a 2-0-0 record versus those same foes, ending UMD's three-year title reign.
- Senior right winger Justin Fontaine paced UMD offensively over the weekend with five points on two goals and three assists. He scored twice and helped set up two other tallies last Friday night at Lake Superior State while becoming the first Bulldog since 1985-86 to collect four or more points in a season opener.
- The 6-6 tie last Friday against the Lakers was the Bulldogs' highest scoring deadlock since they and Wisconsin also settled for a 6-6 draw on Feb. 1, 1992 in Duluth.
- The line of junior left winger Mike Connolly (three points), All-American junior center Jack Connolly (three points) and Fontaine accounted for 11 of UMD's 16 points on the weekend.
- UMD, which owned the third most efficient power-play the country last winter (23.0%) after finishing fourth among all NCAA I clubs the previous year in that department, went 4-for-12 with the man-advantage last weekend.
- Senior Kyle Schmidt, who scored all his career-best 11 goals in even-strength situations one year ago, scored on the power-play for the first time as a Bulldog Friday night at Lake Superior State.
- Four UMD rookies made their collegiate debuts last weekend – defensemen Justin Faulk (who picked up two points in the two games), right winger J.T. Brown, center Max Tardy, and left winger Joe Basaraba.
- Sophomore goaltender Kenny Reiter, who started both Superior Cup outings, registered his first collegiate assist in the 6-6 tie at Lake Superior State. The six goals he surrendered to the Lakers that evening were a career high (and two more than his previous mark).
- Since falling 2-1 in overtime to North Dakota on March 2, 2008, UMD has dropped just one of its 17 extra session games (6-1-10).
- Thirteen of the 21 players who received ice time last weekend came away with at least one point.

### Minnesota State Mavericks

- Minnesota State is 0-0-2 overall on the season after opening the 2010-11 campaign with a pair of ties (5-5 and 1-1) with St. Lawrence last weekend.
- MSU's all-time record in 1,369 games played is 710-531-128 (.565).
- The Mavericks are 144-94-39 (.589) all-time at Verizon Wireless Center.
- MSU stands 22-18-2 all-time in season-opening games.
- MSU begins Western Collegiate Hockey Association action Friday and Saturday with a pair of league road contests at Michigan Tech. The Mavericks went 3-1-0 in games with the Huskies last year and lead in the all-time series with MTU by a 23-13-3 margin.
- Minnesota State head coach Troy Jutting (MSU '07) is in his 11th year at the Maverick men's hockey helm and owns an all-time record of 158-182-49 (.469).
- Senior defenseman Ben Youds has the longest current consecutive games played streak on the Mavericks at 52. Senior defenseman Channing Boe is next at 41. Youds, who led the Mavericks in scoring last year with 3-23=26, was credited with an assist in last Saturday's 1-1 tie with St. Lawrence and now has 4-43=47 in 110 career games. And speaking of senior defenseman Channing Boe, the Bemidji, Minn., native put a team high seven shots on goal in last Friday night's contest vs. St. Lawrence. The seven shots also represents a career-high for Boe.
- Sophomore defenseman Tyler Elbrecht was a +3 in last Friday's game and now is +4 for his two-year MSU career.
- Senior defenseman Kurt Davis had two assists in last Friday's 5-5 tie with St. Lawrence and now has 12-59=71 in 114 career games. MSU's current active leader in career games played, Davis ranks 10th all-time in scoring amongst Maverick defenseman.
- Junior forward Justin Jokinen had his first multiple-point game in last Friday's 5-5 tie with St. Lawrence. Jokinen, who had a goal and an assist vs. the Saints Friday and then tallied MSU's lone goal in Saturday's 1-1 tie, owns 8-4=12 in 50 career games with the Mavericks.
- Dating back to last year, junior forward Michael Dorr has 1-6=7 in the last eight games. Dorr, who has 6-12=16 in 26 career games played with MSU, put a career-high seven shots on goal in MSU's 1-1 tie with St. Lawrence last Saturday.
- Sophomore netminder Phil Cook drew an assist on a goal by Mike Louwerse last Friday and now has two career assists in 19 games played.
- Sophomore forward Eli Zuck netted his first goal of the season in the 5-5 tie with St. Lawrence last Saturday and on the weekend finished with three shots on goal and was +1 in the two non-conference games vs. the Saints. Zuck has 2-0=2 in 19 career games.
- Getting their first career points last Friday were freshman forwards Corey Leivermann (scored MSU's first goal) and Zach Lehrke (assisted on Michael Dorr's power-play goal). Freshman forward J.P. Burkemper, who was +1 and had five shots on goal vs. St. Lawrence last Friday, chipped in with his first career point Saturday when he assisted on Justin Jokinen's goal. Freshman forward Chase Grant also made his collegiate debut vs. St. Lawrence and recorded three shots on goal in two games. Freshman forward Josh McInnis and freshman defenseman Josh Nelson both saw action Saturday in making their first appearances as Mavericks.

### Nebraska Omaha Mavericks

- UNO won the Mutual of Omaha Stampede last weekend, its season-opening tournament, for the fourth straight year, beating Clarkson, 8-0, and #18 RIT, 5-3.
- UNO's eight goals against Clarkson were the most scored since an 8-3 win at Yale on Dec. 29, 2008.
- Fifteen of UNO's 18 skaters registered at least one point in last Friday's 8-0 win over Clarkson.
- Senior Matt Ambroz was named the Stampede MVP after earning three goals and two assists on the weekend.
- UNO's freshman class accounted for four goals and six assists in the two games of the Stampede.
- Freshmen Zahn Raubenheimer, Johnnie Searfoss and Matt White earned their first collegiate goals in their first collegiate games, against Clarkson. Raubenheimer's goal was the game-winner.
- John Faulkner earned his first career shutout, stopping 26 shots in Friday's 8-0 win over Clarkson. For the weekend, Faulkner stopped 49 of 52 shots to earn both wins.
- The Mavericks had 60 shots on goal in last Friday's 8-0 win over Clarkson. It was a school record for shots in a 60-minute game, breaking the old mark of 57 set against Bemidji State on Feb. 19, 1999. The school record for shots in a game is 66 set in a triple overtime game against Alaska on March 9, 2008.
- The Mavericks were 4-for-13 on the power-play over the two games while

stopping all nine opponent power-plays.

- UNO has now won four straight season openers and is unbeaten in its last seven to start the regular season (6-0-1).
- The Mavericks will play the first WCHA games in their history when they visit Minnesota on Oct. 15 and 16.
- UNO has only played the Golden Gophers once before, losing 7-3 on Oct. 11, 2003 in the consolation game of the Mutual of Omaha Stampede.

### North Dakota Fighting Sioux

- Second-ranked North Dakota continues its season-opening, six-game road trip when it opens WCHA play Friday and Saturday at Bemidji State. The series will also mark the opening of BSU's new Bemidji Regional Event Center, one of two new WCHA arenas the Sioux will help open (Minnesota Duluth, Dec. 30).
- UND is 17-1-1 all-time against the Beavers, with the lone loss coming in the second game of the all-time series on Feb. 7, 1970. The Sioux have won nine straight matchups, most recently a home-and-home series Jan. 2-3, 2009. UND is 4-1-0 in games played in Bemidji.
- The Sioux opened the regular season last weekend by winning the Kendall Hockey Classic in Anchorage. UND tied Alaska Anchorage 5-5 in the opener on Friday, and for tournament purposes won a shootout following overtime. The Sioux then defeated No. 12 Alaska 3-1 on Saturday.
- Juniors Jason Gregoire and Brett Hextall, along with senior Matt Frattin, scored in last Saturday's win vs Alaska. Freshman D Derek Forbort had three assists, his first collegiate points. UND out-shot Alaska 30-15, including a 19-5 edge over the first two periods. The Sioux gave up just nine even-strength shots to the Nanooks. Sophomore Aaron Dell, in his first start of the season, stopped 14 of 15 shots.
- Last Friday, the Sioux let a 5-1 second-period lead evaporate and settled for a 5-5 overtime tie with the host Seawolves. Sophomore F Corban Knight had a pair of goals, while Brad Malone, Jake Marto and Carter Rowney provided single tallies. Knight and Evan Trupp scored in the shootout. The tie was UND's first in a regular season opener since a 2-2 overtime draw with New Hampshire to open the 2000-01 season. That Sioux squad would go on to win the MacNaughton Cup and advance to the NCAA Frozen Four championship game.
- UND finished the Oct. 8-9 weekend 4-for-10 on the power-play and 8-for-9 on the penalty-kill.
- Gregoire, with a goal and two assists, was named the tournament's most outstanding player. Knight and Hextall were named to the all-tournament team.
- Dell has now made two career starts at Sullivan Arena and is 2-0 with a 0.50 goals-against average and .968 save percentage.
- Junior goalie Brad Eidsness made his 83rd career appearance last Friday, giving him sole possession of seventh place all-time at UND. Mike "Lefty" Curran (1965-68) ranks sixth with 86. Toby Kvalevog (1993-97) is the program's all-time leader with 121 career games played.
- Senior captain Chay Genoway, playing in his first regular season game since last November, collected a first-period assist last Friday for his 91st career point. Genoway, the leading scorer among active WCHA defenseman, is bidding to become only the ninth defenseman in Sioux history to reach the 100-point plateau.

### St. Cloud State Huskies

- The St. Cloud State men's hockey team opened its 2010-11 season with a weekend split at the Nebraska Omaha tournament. On Oct. 8, the Huskies charted a 3-1 victory over RIT and then completed the weekend with a 6-2 loss against Clarkson on Oct. 9.
- The Huskies' match against RIT was one of at least five games this season that SCSU will play against 2010 NCAA Frozen Four participants in 2010-11. The Huskies will also play games this year against 2010 Frozen Four participants Miami, RIT and Wisconsin.
- Sophomore forward Ben Hanowski, who enjoyed a record-setting prep career at nearby Little Falls H.S., got off to a strong start this past weekend with a pair of goals at the UNO tournament. His game-winner vs. RIT was the first GWG of his career as a Husky.
- SCSU senior forward Garrett Roe added two assists last weekend. He now has 144 career points (5th in the team records) and 89 career assists (5th in the team records) as a Husky. Roe needs 39 points to tie the team scoring record of 183 points set by Ryan Lasch from 2006-10.
- Freshman defender Nick Jensen charted his first collegiate point on Hanowski's game winning goal against RIT.
- Fellow freshman Cam Reid scored his first assist in the game against Clarkson.
- Sophomore netminder Mike Lee scored his first win of the season with the 3-1 win over RIT. He made 26 saves in the game and now has 13 career wins in the cardinal and black.
- SCSU's other goals in Omaha were posted by seniors Nick Oslund and Tony Mosey, along with an empty net goal by junior Travis Novak against RIT.
- The games at the UNO tournament marked the first time that the Huskies had played hockey in Omaha.
- The Huskies will return to the NHC on Oct. 15-16 for a pair of home dates against #3 Miami. Last year, the Huskies dropped a pair of close matches at Miami by scores of 3-2 (ot) and 2-0 on Oct. 9-10, 2009, in Oxford, Ohio. This marks the first time since Oct. 15-16, 1999 that the RedHawks have played in St. Cloud. In that series, Miami gained a 5-4 (ot), 3-2 series sweep at the NHC. In the all-time series, which dates back to a 5-3 loss at Miami on Nov. 14, 1987, the RedHawks own a 7-1-1 record against SCSU. The lone victory for SCSU was a 5-4 victory at Miami on Dec. 11, 1998.
- SCSU coach Bob Motzko served as an associate head coach at Miami during the 1990s and was there when current RedHawk coach Erico Blasi played college hockey for Miami.
- The Huskies and RedHawks will both participate at the 2010 Florida College Hockey Classic in Estero, Fla. this season. SCSU will play Cornell in first round play at the tournament, while Miami will play Maine in the first round.
- Steve Johnson joins the SCSU staff this winter as an assistant coach. He replaces Eric Rud, who is now the head coach with the Green Bay Gamblers of the USHL. Johnson played collegiate hockey with North Dakota and was a Hobey Baker award finalist and the WCHA Student-Athlete of the Year at UND in 1988. Johnson previously served as the head coach of Fargo in the USHL.

### Wisconsin Badgers

- Wisconsin (1-1-0) skates in its home opening weekend as the Badgers welcome Alabama-Huntsville (1-1-0) to the Kohl Center.
- UW split last weekend, falling 4-3 to Boston University, then defeating Holy Cross, 6-0, at the Ice Breaker Tournament in St. Louis. UAH split a home series with CCHA-member Ferris State, falling 4-1 before responding with a 4-2 victory. This will mark the fifth and sixth meetings between the two schools. All four previous meetings have come in Madison.
- The Badgers last met the Alabama-Huntsville Chargers on Dec. 27, 2008 during the Badger Hockey Showdown. Wisconsin came away with a 5-0 victory.
- UAH is the lone Division I independent in college hockey.
- UAH sophomore forward Sebastian Geoffrion and freshman forward Brice Geoffrion are the brothers of 2010 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner Blake Geoffrion. UAH sophomore forward Justin Cseter is a native of Menomonie, Wis.
- UW is 30-15-2 in home openers since restarting its program in 1963. The team sits 4-3-1 in home openers under Head Coach Mike Eaves.
- Nine Badgers made their collegiate debuts last weekend in St. Louis. Leading the way was freshman forward Mark Zengerle, who collected two assists. Other debut's included forwards Michael Mersch, Tyler Barnes, Jason Clark, Jefferson Dahl and Keegan Meuer, as well as defenseman Joe Faust and Frankie Simonelli.
- Sophomore forward Derek Lee paced all Badgers the first weekend with two goals and four points, including two goals and three points on the power-play.

### WCHA Men's Tie-Breaking Procedures - For Playoff Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All 12 teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #12 rank, #2 rank vs #11 rank, #3 vs #10, #4 vs #9, #5 vs #8, and #6 vs #7.

Following the six first round series, the six winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #6 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA Final Five.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.
