No. 1-ranked, MacNaughton Cup champion and No. 1 seed North Dakota (26-8-3) will host No. 12 seed Michigan Tech (4-28-4) at Ralph Engelstad Arena (11,634) at 7:37 pm CT Friday, 7:07 pm CT Saturday and if necessary, at 7:07 pm CT on Sunday. The Sioux, sporting a nine-game unbeaten streak at 8-0-1, won their only two regular season encounters against the Huskies last weekend (March 4-5) in Houghton, 6-1 and 11-2.

No. 2 playoff seed and No. 6-ranked Denver (21-10-5) will entertain No. 11 seed Minnesota State (14-16-6) at Magness Arena (6,026) with face-off times Friday, Saturday and Sunday (if necessary) at 7:37 pm MT, 7:07 pm MT and 7:07 pm MT. The Pioneers went 3-0-1 vs the Mavericks during the regular season, winning 3-2 and 6-1 in Denver on Nov. 12 and 13 and tying 4-4 (ot) and winning 4-3 (ot) in Mankato on Jan. 14-15.

At Qwest Center Omaha (15,595), one of the intriguing match ups pits first-year WCHA members Nebraska Omaha (21-13-2) and Bemidji State (12-17-5) against each other as the No. 3 and No. 10 playoff seeds respectively. Game times Friday thru Sunday (if necessary) are 7:37 pm CT, 7:07 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT. The visiting Beavers were 3-0-1 against the the No. 12-ranked Mavericks during the regular season, winning 3-0 and 3-1 at Sanford Center in Bemidji on Dec. 3-4 and tying 2-2 (ot) and winning 3-2 (ot) in Omaha on Jan. 14-15.

In Duluth this weekend, No. 4 seed and No. 11-ranked Minnesota Duluth (20-9-6) will engage No. 9 seed St. Cloud State (15-16-5) at AMSOIL Arena (6,764), with puck drops at 7:07 pm CT each evening. The Huskies prevailed 1-0-1 over the Bulldogs in their two-game regular season series, posting a 8-2 victory on Feb. 11 before the two clubs tied 3-3 (ot) on Feb. 12.

Minnesota (16-12-6) enters the conference tournament as the No. 5 seed and the No. 17-ranked Golden Gophers will host No. 8 seed Alaska Anchorage (14-17-3) at Mariucci Arena (10,000), with face-off times at 7:07 pm CT across the board. The Gophers, standing unbeaten over their last seven games at 5-0-2, split their only two-game regular season series with the Seawolves on Jan. 28-29 in Minneapolis, winning 5-1 in the opener and falling 1-0 in game two. The Seawolves have won three straight heading into the playoffs.

And out at the Colorado Springs World Arena (7,380), No. 6 seed and No. 16-ranked Colorado College (19-16-3) will entertain No. 7 seed and No. 19-ranked Wisconsin (20-14-4) on Friday at 7:37 pm MT, Saturday at 7:07 pm MT and if necessary, Sunday at 7:07 pm MT. The two rivals played each other last weekend at the Kohl Center in Madison in their only two regular season encounters, with the Tigers prevailing 3-2 last Friday to clinch the home playoff berth and the Badgers coming back for a 3-1 triumph last Saturday.

Following the first round of WCHA playoffs, the six winning teams will be re-seeded No. 1 thru No. 6 according to their regular season finish and will then advance to the 2011 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn. The Final Five will be contested March 17, 18 and 19. There will be two quarterfinal games on Thursday at 3:37 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT, two semi-final games on Friday at 2:07 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT, with the Broadmoor Trophy championship contest on Saturday at 7:07 pm CT. The No. 1 and No. 2 seeded teams for the Final Five will receive a bye on Thursday. The winner of the Broadmoor Trophy receives the WCHA's automatic berth in the NCAA Div. 1 Men's Ice Hockey championship tournament.

The first round the NCAA tournament, to be contested the weekend of March 25-27, will consist of four regionals. The East Regional will be played at Arena at Harbor Yard in Bridgeport, Conn., on Friday and Saturday. The West Regional will be played at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Mo., and will also be played on Friday and Saturday. The Northeast Regional will be contested that Saturday and Sunday at Verizon Wireless Arena in Manchester, N.H., while the Midwest Regional will be on Saturday and Sunday at Resch Center in Green Bay, Wis.

The 2011 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, matching up the four regional winners from the previous weekend, is set for Thursday, April 7 and Saturday, April 9 at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn.

In WCHA action on the final weekend of the regular season – March 4-5 – North Dakota clinched the MacNaughton Cup outright with 6-1 and 11-2 wins at Michigan Tech while Alaska Anchorage swept a pair of road encounters at Minnesota State, 4-0 and 4-1. Minnesota earned three points on the road at Bemidji State by virtue of a 3-3 (ot) tie and 3-2 (ot) win while three series ended in splits. In Duluth, host UMD won 4-1 over Nebraska Omaha last Friday before the Mavericks rebounded with a 5-2 win on Saturday. In Denver, visiting St. Cloud State upended the Pioneers 3-2 last Friday before DU captured game two by the same

score of 3-2. And in Madison, visiting Colorado College skated off with a 3-2 victory over Wisconsin last Friday with the Badgers rallying back for a 3-1 verdict last Saturday.

Those results set the final regular season WCHA standings. North Dakota claimed the league championship with a 21-6-1 WCHA mark in 28 games for 43 points, six better than runner-up Denver. The Pioneers finished 17-8-3 for 37 points. First-year WCHA-member Nebraska Omaha placed an impressive third overall with a 17-9-2 mark and 36 points while Minnesota Duluth was fourth at 15-8-5 for 35 points. Minnesota placed fifth with 31 points on a 13-10-5 league mark while Colorado College was sixth with 28 points and a 13-13-2 record. Wisconsin wound up seventh with 27 points and a 12-13-3 mark while Alaska Anchorage (12-14-2) and St. Cloud State (11-13-4) tied for eighth with 26 points apiece. UAA earned the higher playoff seed by virtue of more league wins. The WCHA's other new men's member team – Bemidji State – placed 10th with 21 points and a 8-15-5 league slate, Minnesota State was 11th with a 8-16-4 record and 20 points, and Michigan Tech was 12th with six points and a 2-24-2 record.

In this week's (March 7, 2011) USCHO.com Men's Div. 1 Hockey National Poll, the WCHA has seven member teams again ranked among the nation's top 20. North Dakota is again No. 1, Denver is No. 6, Minnesota Duluth is No. 11, Nebraska Omaha is No. 12, Colorado College is No. 16, Minnesota is No. 17 and Wisconsin is No. 19. Also receiving votes in the poll was St. Cloud State.

In this week's (March 7, 2011) USA Hockey/USA Hockey Magazine Div. 1 Men's Poll, North Dakota is No. 1, Denver is No. 6, Minnesota Duluth is No. 11 and Nebraska Omaha is No. 12. Also receiving votes were Colorado College, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Through games of March 7, the 12 WCHA men's member teams own a collective 51-25-12 record in games vs other Div. 1 clubs this season for a .648 winning percentage. WCHA teams are 28-10-10 in non-conference games at home, 12-9-2 in non-conference games on the road, and 10-6-0 in non-conference match ups at neutral sites. Against the four other Div. 1 men's leagues, WCHA teams are 9-5-1 (.633) vs Hockey East Association teams, 7-8-4 (.474) vs ECAC Hockey teams, 17-10-7 (.603) vs Central Collegiate Hockey Association clubs, 12-0-0 (1.000) vs Atlantic Hockey Association teams, and 6-2-0 (.750) vs independents.

Team records in non-conference play are: Alaska Anchorage (2-2-0), Bemidji State (4-2-0), Colorado College (5-3-1), Denver (4-2-2), Michigan Tech (2-4-2), Minnesota (3-2-1), Minnesota Duluth (5-0-1), Minnesota State (6-0-2), Nebraska Omaha (4-4-0), North Dakota (4-2-1), St. Cloud State (4-3-1) and Wisconsin (8-1-1).

Home to a record 36 national championship teams since it's founding in 1951, the WCHA marks it's 59th season of on-ice competition in 2010-11 with 12 men's member teams. Joining the men's WCHA this season are Bemidji State University and the University of Nebraska Omaha.

Announcement of WCHA Men's Individual Awards for 2010-11 Set for Thursday, March 10

The 2010-11 WCHA men's individual award winners will be announced by the league office via press release (WCHA.com) on Thursday, March 10 at approximately 4:30 pm CT. The awards consist of WCHA Player of the Year, WCHA Student-Athlete of the Year, WCHA Defensive Player of the Year, WCHA Rookie of the Year, WCHA Coach of the Year, WCHA Scoring Champion, WCHA Goaltending Champion, All-WCHA First Team, All-WCHA Second Team, All-WCHA Third Team and All-WCHA Rookie Team. Also included in the announcement will be the release of the annual men's All-WCHA Academic Team.

The conference office will also make arrangements to bring the seven individual major award winners (player of the year, student-athlete of the year, defensive player of the year, rookie of the year, scoring champion, goaltending champion and coach of the year) – based on availability – into Saint Paul for the 2011 Red Baron WCHA Final Five. The six major award winners will appear at a press conference in the Media Interview Room at Xcel Energy Center between the two semi-finals on Friday, March 18, make a brief public appearance at Fan Fest on Saturday afternoon, March 19, at approximately 4:30 pm and be acknowledged in a special pre-game ceremonial puck-drop before the Broadmoor Trophy championship game on Saturday night, March 19.

North Dakota's Frattin, Dell Earn WCHA Scoring, Goaltending Titles for 2010-11

The individual races for the 2010-11 WCHA scoring and goaltending championships, which are based on league games only, have resulted in two new champions being crowned, and both hail from MacNaughton Cup champion North Dakota.

Fighting Sioux senior forward Matt Frattin (Edmonton, AB) is the WCHA scoring champion after recording 40 points (22g, 18a) in 28 league games. He averaged 1.43 points per game. Runner-up to Frattin was UMD junior forward Jack Connolly (9-28=37) while Denver freshman forward Jason Zucker (20-16=36) was third. Zucker was bidding to become only the second freshman in the history of the league to win the scoring title; DU's Ven Venasky won as a freshman in 1970-71 with 39 points (14g, 25a) in 22 games.

The WCHA goaltending championship for 2010-11 is North Dakota sophomore Aaron Dell (Airdrie, AB). Dell posted a 1.97 goals-against average in 25 conference games, along with a 19-4-1 WCHA record and a .912 saves percentage over 1432:09 of action. Minnesota's Kent Patterson was second with a 2.31 goals-against mark while Minnesota Duluth's Kenny Reiter was third at 2.32.

WCHA Announces Record Group of 90 Men's and Women's Scholar-Athletes for 2010-11 Sixth Annual Class Includes 30 Repeat Honorees

MADISON, Wis. – The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, through Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, University of Alaska Anchorage Faculty Representative Steve Strom (Chair, men's league) and University of North Dakota Faculty Representative Sue Jenö (Chair, women's league) announced on Feb. 10, 2011 that a total of 90 men's and women's student-athletes make up the sixth annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipients. Over the first six years of the award, there have now been 414 honorees representing all 12 men's member and all eight women's member institutions. The previous record for honorees in one season was 80 in 2009-10.

The prestigious WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award was developed through Association member team Faculty Representatives and approved by the conference membership beginning with the 2005-06 season. To earn recognition as a WCHA Scholar-Athlete, conference-member student-athletes must have completed at least one year of residency at their present institution prior to the current academic year and must also have a grade-point average of at least 3.50 on a 4.0 scale for the previous two semesters or three quarters, or may qualify if his or her overall GPA is at least 3.50 for all terms at his or her present institution.

"The Western Collegiate Hockey Association is both thrilled and exceptionally proud to announce this group of men's and women's WCHA Scholar-Athletes for the 2010-11 season," said WCHA Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, University of Alaska Anchorage Faculty Representative Steve Strom (Chair, men's league) and University of North Dakota Faculty Representative Sue Jenö (Chair – women's league) in a joint statement.

"This annual announcement of our Scholar-Athletes has become one of the highlights for the entire Western Collegiate Hockey Association family of student-athletes, coaches and administrators and gives us an opportunity to showcase the fact that along with being great athletes on the ice, these honorees are truly exceptional students off the ice. The rigorous classroom schedules they maintain, as well as their intense commitments to their sport, are most impressive and to be able to achieve what they have is inspiring to all of us. Together, they represent the very best in collegiate athletics."

Thirty (30) of this season's 90 men's and women's WCHA Scholar-Athletes are repeat honorees, including a four-time recipient and 11 three-time winners. Earning the distinguished honor for the fourth time is North Dakota's Chay Genoway (2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11), who becomes only the third student-athlete to do so. The two other four-time recipients have been Scott McCulloch of Colorado College (2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08, 2008-09) and Jenna Hewitt of Minnesota State (2006-07, 2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10).

Eleven other of this season's honorees earned the WCHA Scholar-Athlete award for the third time in their careers. They are: Annie Bauerfeld, BSU; Erin Cody, BSU; Chris Nutini, DU; Kyle Ostrow, DU; Kenny Reiter, UMD; Kyle Schmidt, UMD; Rylan Galiardi, MSU; Austin Lee, MSU; Nina Tikkinen, MSU; Amy Udvig, MSU; and Courtney Josefson, SCSU.

SAINT PAUL, Minn. – At a press conference held March 20, 2010 in conjunction with the annual Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association revealed it's new post-season tournament format (beginning in 2010-11), unveiled a new Broadmoor Trophy to go to the league's annual playoff champion and welcomed new Association-members Bemidji State University and the University of Nebraska Omaha into the conference family.

On hand for the press conference were WCHA Commissioner Bruce McLeod, Minnesota Wild Vice-President Bill Robertson, Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards of Colorado Springs, Colo., Bemidji State Faculty Representative Doug Leif and 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey player Phil Verchota speaking on behalf of BSU, and Nebraska Omaha Director of Athletics Trev Alberts. Also making a special appearance was Paul Kelly, CEO of College Hockey, Inc., and former Executive Director of the NHLPA.

"We are very excited to announce what we will feel will be a very positive evolution in the long and successful history of our WCHA Final Five beginning next season," said McLeod. "A tremendous amount of work has gone into this process and numerous ideas and concepts were discussed. But ultimately our goal was to preserve the tremendously popular event we have now, continue to build on that success and add a couple of intriguing new twists."

"The Red Baron WCHA Final Five has become a perennial favorite in Saint Paul,"



said Xcel Energy Center Vice President and General Manager Jack Larson. "The new format will make it even better. We are very proud to host to this tournament and honored to play a part in this exciting new era for the WCHA."

Beginning in 2010-11 the WCHA post-season championship will consist of six first round, best-of-three series on campus sites. The No. 1 seed will host the No. 12 seed, the No. 2 seed will host the No. 11 seed, No. 3 will host No. 10, No. 4 will host No. 9, No. 5 will host No. 8 and No. 6 will host No. 7.

Following the completion of the first round, the six winning teams will advance to the WCHA Final Five at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul. The brackets for the Final Five will be pre-set and the top two seeded teams will receive a bye. The 2011 Red Baron WCHA Final Five, set for March 17-19, will get underway with two games on Thursday on a single-ticket for the opening day. The Thursday games are set for 3:37 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT. Team No. 3 will play Team No. 6 and Team No. 4 will play Team No. 5.

On Friday of Final Five weekend, Thursday's winners will advance to take on the top two-seeded teams in a pair of semifinal matchups on Friday with separate admission tickets set for 2:07 pm and 7:07 pm. As the brackets will be pre-set, the matchups on Friday could be different than usual. And there will no longer be a third place game.

Then on 'WCHA championship Saturday', hockey fans are in for a special treat with a National Hockey League–WCHA doubleheader. The Minnesota Wild will play a regularly-scheduled NHL game tentatively set for 1:00 pm at Xcel Energy Center, followed by the Final Five title contest at 7:07 pm CT. A limited number of tickets for the Minnesota Wild NHL game will be made available to Final Five season ticket purchasers who meet a prescribed deadline.

"Our Final Five name is such a strong brand for us we wanted to make every effort to preserve that," added McLeod. "And with the championship still consisting of five games, we were able to do that."

"This will be a great opportunity to see an NHL game and presents numerous possibilities for the WCHA and the Minnesota Wild to do a lot of cross-marketing with the connection between college and pro hockey. We think it's a win-win situation for all!"

The WCHA also unveiled a new Broadmoor Trophy at the press conference, which is presented to the winning team of the league's annual playoff championship. The new bronze cast trophy, created by Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards of Colorado Springs, Colo., is a recreation of the famous Broadmoor Hotel, host to numerous past national championships and the former home of Colorado College hockey.

"We worked closely with Steve Bartlett of the Broadmoor Hotel and Bill and Karen Busobusky of Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards and could not be more pleased with how the project has come to fruition," said McLeod. "Our MacNaughton Cup has long been recognized as one of the most impressive trophies in all of intercollegiate athletics and we know that this spectacular new Broadmoor Trophy will take a back seat to none. We are greatly indebted to the Broadmoor Hotel and want to recognize their long and significant relationship with the WCHA and college hockey in general."

There will be a total of three Broadmoor Trophies. The largest will be on permanent display at the Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul in conjunction with the WCHA Final Five, one will be a traveling trophy, and one will be given to the winning team each year as a permanent addition to their display case.

WCHA Member Team Weekly Notebooks

Seawolves

University of Alaska Anchorage

- The Alaska Anchorage Seawolves (14-17-3, 12-14-2 WCHA) will face the Minnesota Gophers for the WCHA 1st Round Playoffs in a best-of-three series on March 11-12 and on March 13, if necessary. UAA and UM split the regular season series with UM winning on Jan. 28, 5-1, before UAA came back to win on Jan. 29, 1-0.
- Since joining the league, the Seawolves have met the Golden Gophers in five playoff series – their most common opponent. UM leads UAA in the playoffs, 10-1-0. The last meeting in the post season occurred on March 11, 2007, with UM winning, 3-1. The only Seawolf win came on March 10, 2007 (2-1).
- UAA wrapped up the regular season with its best conference record under sixth-year bench boss Dave Shyjak and its best since the Seawolves' first season in the league in 1993-94. The Seawolves (26 points) finish the season tied for No. 8 in the conference with St. Cloud State, following a SCSU loss and a win by Wisconsin on March 5.
- In the March 4-5 series against Minnesota State, the Seawolves posted their first WCHA road sweep of the season and third league sweep of the season. The last time the Seawolves swept an opponent on the road was Jan. 15-16, 2010 at Michigan Tech (6-2, 5-4), while it was the first time UAA has ever swept MSU on the road. The last time UAA had back-to-back wins against the Mavericks was on Jan. 15-16, 1993 at home.
- On March 4, the Seawolves shutout the Mavericks, 4-0 – UAA's first win at MSU since Jan. 16, 2009 (4-2). The shutout was the first ever at Minnesota State and just the second ever against the Mavericks – first was on Jan. 24, 1997 at home (1-0) in overtime. The shutout was also UAA's second of the season – first was on Jan. 29 at Minnesota (1-0). The last time UAA posted two shutouts in a single season was in 2008-09 – both against UAF, while the last time UAA swept two WCHA opponents in a season was in 2005-06 (DU, UMD).
- The Seawolves kept the Mavericks scoreless on all 11 power-play opportunities in the series. UAA's penalty-kill unit improved greatly in the second half of the season, going 70/76 (.921) compared to 63/83 (.753) in the first half. UAA's PK is currently tied for No. 3 in the league with SCSU at 84.2.
- Individually, freshman G Chris Kamal (12 gp, .896 sv%, 2.65 gaa) picked up the win's in net against MSU for a 7-4-1 record. The shutout was Kamal's second of the season – first was against UM on Jan. 29. Kamal became one of 12 UAA netminders to register two or more shutout in their careers. Stretching back to the UAA's 4-1 win over Alaska Fairbanks on Feb. 26, the rookie from Alpharetta, Ga., has posted 85 saves, while allowing only two goals.
- Senior F Tommy Grant netted three goals against the Mavericks, including two game-winning goals. Grant leads UAA in goals (15) and points (15) and GWG (5). Grant's 15 goals ties his career-high from his sophomore season. He is currently in a career-high-tying six game point streak with 5-2=7 totals and a three-game goal streak.
- On March 4, senior F Nick Haddad recorded his first multi-goal game of his collegiate career. Freshman F Jordan Kwas has posted 0-4=4 totals in the last four games and leads UAA in assists (17) and second in points (21).
- On March 5, freshman D Quinn Sproule recorded his first points of his collegiate career with two assists. Senior F Craig Parkinson picked up an assist for a career-best 20 points and is now 1-4=5 in the last three contests.

- The Bemidji State University men's ice hockey team wrapped up the 2010-11 regular season, its first as a member of the WCHA, with an overall record of 12-17-5 and a 8-15-5 mark in league play for a 10th place in the league standings.
- The No. 10 seed in the WCHA playoffs travels to Omaha, Neb. and the Quest Center for a postseason match up with fellow WCHA newcomer and No. 3 seed University of Nebraska at Omaha March 11-13. The Beavers and Mavericks went head-to-head four times during the regular season and the Beavers came away with the season series posting a 3-0-1 mark. BSU swept UNO, 3-0 and 3-1 at Sanford Center Dec. 3-4 before traveling to Omaha, Neb. Jan. 14-15 for a pair of overtime games. The Beavers and Mavericks tied 2-2 in game one and BSU pulled off a 3-2 overtime victory in game two.
- Bemidji State is 4-1-1 versus Nebraska Omaha over the last two seasons and 4-5-1 record versus the Mavericks all-time. BSU is 2-5-1 all-time in Omaha, Neb.
- Bemidji State is 5-4-1 in the post season of the course of the last three sea-

sons.

- BSU has played 14 of its last 20 games away from Sanford Center and was 4-4-2 in its last 10 road games.
- The Beavers are coming off a weekend it which they were 0-1-1 against Minnesota. The Beavers took an early 2-1 lead Friday, but needed a power-play goal from Brad Hunt to force overtime and salvage 3-3 tie. Saturday, BSU again got out to an early 2-0 lead and were up 2-1 with 20 minutes to play, but conceded a power-play goal with just over five minutes to play and lost just 20 seconds into overtime. BSU is 1-8-1 all-time versus Minnesota.
- BSU out shot Minnesota 36-30 last Friday, marking the first time in four games the Beavers recorded more shots than their opponents. Minnesota finished the weekend with a 77-67 edge in shots on goal as BSU allowed a season-high 47 shots Saturday.
- Goaltender Dan Bakala posted a career-high 44 saves in the loss surpassing his previous best of 41 set in a 2-1 overtime loss to Minnesota State Feb. 4.
- BSU has been out shot 21 times in 34 games this season and has been out shot 1,001-855 overall and 848-675 in league play this season.
- Brad Hunt posted his second goal of the season Friday (2-17=19). Hunt now has 13 career power-play goals is tied with Clay Simmons (1999-02) for BSU's Division I-era mark for power-play goals by a defenseman. Hunt is tied for third on the team in 2010-11 with 2-9=11 points on the power-play.
- Brad Hunt has developed an affinity for scoring at Sanford Center. Of his 19 total points, 1-12=13 have come on home ice.
- With a pair of overtime contests to wrap up the regular season, BSU has played 11 games that have been extended to overtime. BSU has played more OT games only one season since making the jump to NCAA Division I for the 1999-2000 season. The 2002-03 Beavers played 15 OT contests. BSU's five ties this season match 1991-92 and 2005-06 for second most ties in the history of Beaver hockey behind only 2002-03 (8).
- Last Friday night nine BSU players wrote their names in the scoring column with each posting just one point matching a season-high.
- Senior forward Ryan Cramer recorded his seventh assist of the season last Friday. Cramer, who has 2-7=9 points this season, has four points (1-3=4) in BSU's last six outings.
- Matt Read scored his team-leading 18th goal of 2010-11 last Friday night. With 18-13=31 points this season, he trails only Jordan George who leads the team with 15-17=32 points.
- BSU converted one of seven power-play opportunities on the weekend. Despite owning the third-most efficient power-play unit in the league (.212), BSU has managed just four power-play goals in its last eight games and 25 man-advantage opportunities (.160).
- After allowing six power-play goals on 11 man advantage opportunities Feb. 26-27 at North Dakota, the BSU penalty-kill bounced back last weekend holding Minnesota scoreless on three of four chances. In 2010-11, the unit has held opponents scoreless on 123-of-155 opponent man-advantage opportunities this season (.794).
- Matt Read made his 143rd consecutive appearance for the Beavers last Friday night matching Matt Pope and John Haider for the BSU Division I-era record for games played. Read was injured in the game and missed his first game since he stepped on campus at BSU in the fall of 2007 Saturday.
- Sophomore forward Aaron McLeod scored a goal in each game of last weekend's series, marking the first time in his young career he has scored in back-to-back games.
- Junior Darcy Findlay, who had just one assist entering last weekend's series posted an assist in each game.

Tigers

Colorado College

- The Tigers, who are hosting a first-round playoff series for the 16th time in the last 18 years, are trying to reach the WCHA Final Five for just the second time in the last six.
- Wisconsin and Colorado College last met in the opening round of the post-season in 1997, when CC swept the first two games of a best-of-three set at the Air Force Academy's Cadet Ice Arena. The second contest of that series, which ended with a 1-0 score, required four overtimes.
- While going 0-2-1 the last three Saturdays, the Tigers have out-shot their opponents by a combined margin of 111-65 while scoring a total of five goals.
- Heading into this week's playoff series, CC owns a 10-3-1 record against the Badgers in the last 14 meetings between the teams dating back to the 2006-07

season.

- Junior David Civitarese, who typically centers the team's fourth line, has scored the game-winning goal in Colorado College's last two victories. He has four red lighters overall for the season.
- Third-period tallies by senior winger Stephen Schultz and Civitarese in last Friday's 3-2 triumph at UW came 2:28 apart and marked the 18th occasion in 2010-11 that the Tigers have struck twice within two and a half minutes. They've scored twice within a minute eight times.
- Schultz, who also set up junior defenseman Gabe Guentzel's power-play goal on Friday, recorded his ninth multiple-point performance of the season.
- CC's freshmen collectively have accounted for 97 points (35g, 62a) this season after adding four more (1g, 3a) to their total last weekend, when rookie winger Dakota Eveland and defenseman Eamonn McDermott combined to set up Skalbeck's goal on Saturday. Left winger Jaden Schwartz, who saw an eight-game point-scoring streak snapped in the series finale, picked up an assist in Friday's victory.
- The Tigers, who are 19-1-3 in 2010-11 when leading or tied at the end of two periods, remain winless (0-15) when trailing after 40 minutes of play.
- CC has scored in the opening four minutes of a period on 18 occasions this season and in the first three and a half minutes of a game on nine.
- Junior center and assistant captain Nick Dineen won 32 of 43 faceoffs (74.4%), including a glittering 19 of 23 (82.6%) in Friday's 3-2 victory, during last week's split at Wisconsin.
- Four CC players – Dineen, Gabe Guentzel, team captain Ryan Lowery and Joe Marciano – have played in every game this season.
- Twenty different players have factored in on at least one game-winning goal for Colorado College in 2010-11.
- It's been two full decades since the Tigers, who lost a best-of-three series at Minnesota Duluth a year ago, have needed to travel for the opening round of the WCHA playoffs in consecutive years. They earned home ice for this weekend by winning close games against quality opponents and suffering only two losses (3-2-2) in their last seven games of the regular season. Their last four victories, dating back to a 3-2 decision over the University of Denver on Feb. 4, have been by a single tally, giving Colorado College a 9-5-3 record in one-goal games for the campaign.

Pioneers

University of Denver

- No. 2 seed Denver (21-10-5) hosts No. 11 seed Minnesota State (14-16-6) in the first round of the WCHA Playoffs on March 11, 12 and 13 (if necessary) at Magness Arena.
- DU finished second in the WCHA with 37 points, while Minnesota State was 11th with 20 points.
- The Pioneers seeks their fourth consecutive trip to the Red Baron WCHA Final Five on March 17-19 at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, Minn.
- The Pioneers are fifth in the latest PairWise Rankings and have won 20 or more games for 10 straight seasons.
- DU and Minnesota State meet for the first time in the WCHA Playoffs.
- The Pioneers are 73-56-6 all-time in the WCHA playoffs, including a league-high 15 playoff championships.
- DU went 3-0-1 against the Mavericks this season, outscoring Minnesota State 17-10 in the four games. Denver holds a 22-13-6 advantage against Minnesota State in the all-time series that dates back to 1997. The Pioneers are unbeaten at 8-0-2 in their last 10 games against the Mavericks. DU is 12-4-2 all-time against the Mavericks in Denver, including a two-game sweep (3-2, 6-1) earlier this season. DU's last loss against Minnesota State was a 3-2 decision on Feb. 2, 2008, in Mankato.
- Drew Shore (22-21=43) and Jason Zucker (20-18=38) lead Denver in scoring. Zucker finished third in conference scoring with 36 points (20g, 16a), while Shore tied for fourth with 34 points (15g, 19a). Zucker led all WCHA rookies in league and overall scoring. Shore and Zucker rank sixth and 11th, respectively, in WCHA overall scoring. Zucker was named AHCA Rookie of the Month for February. Shore, who was named AHCA Player of the Month for November, has 15 points (8g, 7a) during his career-high, 10-game point streak.
- David Makowski ranks second among WCHA rookie defenseman in overall scoring with 23 points (5g, 18a) and conference scoring with 22 points (4g, 18a).
- Goaltender Sam Brittain (15-7-5, 2.28 GAA, .922 Sv%) ranks first in the WCHA in save percentage, and third in goals-against average and winning percentage (.648) for all games. Brittain has started the last three games for the Pioneers.
- The Pioneers are first in the WCHA on the penalty-kill at 86.1% and ninth on the power-play at 17.9%.

- DU players Jesse Martin (28), Dustin Jackson (12), Nick Shore (9), Adam Murray (6), Kyle Ostrow (6), Beau Bennett (5), Chris Knowlton (4), Paul Phillips (4), and John Lee (3) have missed a combined 77 games due to injury. Drew Shore (2) and Jason Zucker (2) missed a combined four games while playing for Team USA at the World Junior Championship, while David Makowski have served one-game suspensions.
- DU honored its senior class of 2011 – Kyle Ostrow, Jesse Martin, Dustin Jackson, Anthony Maiani, Chris Nutini, Jon Cook, Joey Brehm and Josh Rosenholtz – during the first intermission on March 5.

Huskies

Michigan Technological University

- Michigan Tech and North Dakota will face off for the second week in a row, but this time in Grand Forks for the first round of the WCHA Playoffs.
- The Huskies and Fighting Sioux have met 10 times in the WCHA Playoffs when the multi-game format is used, including three times in the last four years.
- Tech has been victorious twice in the playoffs against UND and has gone on to finish second (1960) and third (1981) in the NCAA Tournament.
- Freshman Daniel Holmberg has scored two goals in his last four games, including the lone goal for the Huskies last Friday night.
- Sophomore Carl Nielsen scored his first goal of the season last Saturday.
- Jacob Johnstone's three-game point streak came to an end last weekend after he failed to record a point.
- The freshman class recorded four (2g, 2a) of the team's seven points on the weekend. The freshman class leads the team in goals (42), assists (52) and points (94).
- With the playoff series at UND this weekend, head coach Jamie Russell will have faced the Fighting Sioux more than other team in the nation.
- The team handed out their annual awards following Saturday's game: Harold Meese Sportsmanship Award – Daniel Holmberg; Elov Seger Memorial Award for Most Improved Player – Brad Stebner; George McCarthy Performance Award for Scholastic and Athletic Achievement – Bennett Royer; Gitzen-Loutit Memorial Award for the Outstanding Defensive Player – Carl Nielsen; Norbert Matovich Memorial Award as Outstanding Freshman – Ryan Furne; Rick Yeo Unsung Hero Award – Patrick McCadden; Merv Youngs Most Valuable Player – Milos Gordic; John MacInnes Slide Rule Award – Corson Cramer; and the Wildcat Slayer Award – Deron Cousens.

Golden Gophers

University of Minnesota

- Minnesota wrapped up the WCHA regular season last weekend with a win and a tie at Bemidji State. The Gophers finished fifth in the league and will host eighth-seeded Alaska Anchorage this weekend in the first round of the WCHA playoffs.
- The Gophers are 26-1 in first round WCHA playoff games at Mariucci Arena. Their lone loss was a 2-1 overtime setback to Alaska Anchorage on March 10, 2007.
- This will be the third time in the last six years that Minnesota and Alaska Anchorage will meet in the first round of the WCHA Playoffs. The teams met in 2006 and 2007 and Minnesota outscored the Seawolves by a combined 23-11 while posting a 4-1 record.
- Minnesota finished the regular season with only four road losses, which is the fewest amount of road defeats for the Gophers since the 2006-07 season when they lost twice away from home (at Wisconsin and at St. Cloud State) during the regular season.
- The Gophers beat Bemidji State 3-2 in overtime last Saturday. It was Minnesota's first overtime win in 13 games and first since they defeated Northeastern 3-2 on Jan. 3, 2009.
- Last Saturday also marked the first time this season that Minnesota won a game trailing after two periods. The Gophers were down 2-1 with 20 minutes left to play, but rallied for the 3-2 overtime win. It was their first win while trailing after two periods since they rallied to beat Bowling Green 3-1 on Jan. 2, 2010.
- The Gophers tied Bemidji State 3-3 last Friday night, but it was the first time all season that Minnesota earned a point when trailing after the first period. The Beavers led 2-1 after the first period. Saturday, was the first time Minnesota won this year when trailing after one period. The Gophers were 0-8-0 on the season when trailing after the first period before last weekend, but are now 1-8-1.
- Senior Jay Barriball, who returned to action last week after missing six games with a lower-body injury, had four assists against Bemidji State. He had a hand in all three goals last Saturday when he tied his career high with three assists in a

- Barriball's first assist last Friday was the 75th of his career. He now has 51 career goals and 78 career assists, which puts him in elite company. Since 1950, he is only the 33rd Gopher to reach 50 career goals and 75 career assists in his career. He is the first Minnesota player to accomplish the feat since Troy Riddle (2000-04) ended his career with 82 goals and 96 assists.
- Freshman Nick Bjugstad recorded the second three-point game of his career last Saturday when he had two goals (including the overtime game-winner) and an assist at Bemidji State. Bjugstad also had two goals and an assist against Michigan Tech on Feb. 25. He now has 15 points (6g-9a) in his 14 games since returning from the World Junior Championship.
- Senior Pat White had two goals last Friday against Bemidji State. It was the first multiple-goal game of his career.

Bulldogs University of Minnesota Duluth

- For the second time in as many years, the Bulldogs will hunker down at home for the opening round of the WCHA playoffs as UMD welcomes St. Cloud State University to AMSOIL Arena for a best-of-three series. The two clubs met just twice during the regular season with the Huskies taking three of a possible four points from the host Bulldogs via a 8-2 victory and 3-3 tie on Feb. 11-12.
- UMD was the only WCHA club which went the entire regular season without being swept by any opponent – the first time that has ever happened since the Bulldogs joined the NCAA Division I ranks in 1961-62 – and picked up at least one point in all of its WCHA series (another program first). The Bulldogs also will head into postseason play sporting the fewer losses (9) than all but one WCHA foe – North Dakota (8).
- The Bulldogs have posted their third straight 20-plus win season, the longest such stretch for them since the mid-1980s and enter this weekend sporting a .657 winning percentage. That's the seventh best regular season mark ever turned in by a UMD club in 50 years of NCAA membership and the second fewest losses (the 1984-85 Bulldogs went into the post season with only seven setbacks in tow).
- UMD owns a 20-10-2 mark in 32 lifetime WCHA home playoff games. That includes a 2-1-0 record against St. Cloud State, whom the Bulldogs ousted in the first round of the 2002-03 playoffs.
- The Bulldogs traded wins with Nebraska Omaha last weekend in the regular season finales for both clubs, winning 4-1 last Friday before dropping a 5-2 decision the following evening. Junior Travis Oleksuk scored twice in the opener while senior left winger Kyle Schmidt and rookie right winger J.T. Brown each were credited with two assists. Rookie right winger Joe Basaraba and senior right winger Justin Fontaine accounted for the two UMD goals last Saturday with junior All-American Jack Connolly assisted on both of them.
- The Bulldogs are 10-5-2 at home this winter, but just 3-4-2 at AMSOIL Arena since moving to that \$80-million, 6,764-seat facility on Dec. 30 from the DECC (where they compiled a 7-1-0 mark).
- Three Bulldogs currently occupy the top five spots in the WCHA's overall scoring charts at the moment – junior All-American center Jack Connolly is first with 51 points, and senior right winger Justin Fontaine is tied for third (46 pts.) and junior left winger Mike Connolly is fifth (45). That line has combined for 42.8 percent of the team's scoring harvest this winter (142 of 332 points). In league games only, Jack Connolly wound up second in the WCHA scoring race with 37 points – just three points back of champion Matt Frattin of North Dakota. No Bulldog has finished as the WCHA scoring leader since Junior Lessard in 2003-04, although Justin Fontaine came within two points of accomplishing that feat as both a sophomore and junior.
- Jack Connolly, who has skated in all 118 games since joining the UMD program in 2008-09 – the longest ironman streak of any current Bulldog, ranks third among all NCAA pucksters in total points and is second in assists (a WCHA-leading 38). The 2010-11 WCHA Preseason Player of the Year has generated the Bulldogs' highest scoring yield (51 points) since the 2003-04 season (Junior Lessard with 63 and Evan Schwabe with 57) and reached the 50-point plateau faster (35 games) than any UMD puckster in 17 years (Chris Marinucci did in 32 outings on his way to receiving the Hobey Baker Memorial Award. This past December, Connolly over the 100-point mark this past December (he now has 129) and joined Fontaine (152) and Mike Connolly (127) in the Bulldog Century Club, which now contains 51 members. The last time UMD sported at least three players with 100 or more lifetime points to their credit was in 1997-98 when the line of Mike Peluso, Ken Dzikowski and Joe Rybar all eclipsed that milestone at some point during the season. Jack Connolly had his career-high 11-game scoring streak – the longest by

- a Bulldog in tow years – snapped in last Friday's 4-1 win over Nebraska Omaha.
- Fontaine, who is a team-leading +21 this season, is third among his WCHA brethren power-play goals at the moment with 10. The two-time All-WCHA second team selection now shares 18th place (with Tim Stapleton, 2002-06) on UMD's all-time points list and has a shot – he needs 13 points – at becoming the first Bulldog in 17 years (Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner Chris Marinucci was the last in 1993-94) to crack the Top 15. Next in line is No. 17 Monty Jones (153 between 1973-77) and No. 16 Mike Peluso (163 pts., 194-98). Since the opening of 2008-09, no current WCHA combatant has racked up more points (140) than Fontaine.
- Mike Connolly, who is just the second NCAA-era Bulldog ever to open his career with three straight 40-point seasons. Dan Lempe, the school's all-time scoring leader, is the other UMD skater to accomplish that feat (he did it four times between 1976-80) since the Bulldogs became a NCAA I member 49 years ago. Since the start of February, Connolly has amassed a whopping 10 goals – including a school record-tying five in UMD's 6-4 over Minnesota four weeks ago – and six assists in 10 games. Connolly leads all current Bulldogs in playoff scoring with 14 points (5g, 9a) in 11 games and is a +7 to boot.
- UMD has cashed in on eight of 24 man-advantage opportunities (33.3%) over the past five games and currently sports the WCHA's third most efficient power-play (21.9%).
- Justin Faulk is currently the second-highest scoring rookie defenseman in the country and is tied for first among NCAA freshmen blueliners in total goals as well. In 31 games this season the South St. Paul, Minn., product has collected seven goals (six of which have come on the power-play,) and 17 assists for 24 points. (The last first-year UMD defenseman to turn in a higher scoring yield was two-time All-American Norm Maciver with 27 points in 1982-83). Faulk sports the fourth best plus-minus rating (+17) of any 2010-11 Bulldog and has finished with a negative figure in only six games all season. Earlier this winter, he competed with the U.S. at the recent IIHF World Junior Championships in Buffalo and paced that team's defense in scoring.
- The Bulldogs have outscored the opposition by a sizable 83-58 margin from the second period on this season and have a NCAA-leading five overtime victories to their 2010-11 credit. They have also given up the fewest third-period goals (25) of any WCHA club this season. In addition, UMD is 15-0-1 when it's taken a lead into the final period of play.
- After putting the clamps on an eight-game pointless skid at Michigan Tech on Jan. 21, freshman right winger J.T. Brown has picked up points in 10 of 12 outings since, collecting nine goals and seven assists over that time. Brown, the Hockey Commissioner's Association National Rookie of the Month for October, resides in the No. 4 spot on the WCHA rookie scoring list with 32 points (14g, 18a) and one of just six Bulldogs to accrue ice time in all 35 games to date – the lone newcomer to do so.
- UMD is now unbeaten in 26 of its last 28 overtime games (11-2-15) – a run which dates back to the start of the 2008-09 season. A school-record 12 of the Bulldogs' 33 engagements this winter have required an extra session, and UMD is 5-1-6 in those. The five OT victories equals a UMD standard set in 1984-85. Mike Connolly shares the current Bulldog lead (with fellow junior forward Travis Oleksuk).
- In four career playoff appearances (all starts), junior goaltender Kenny Reiter has compiled a 2-2-0 record with a stingy 1.97 goals-against average and a .927 saves percentage. Reiter started both ends of the UNO series last weekend, including Friday night when he turned aside 29 of 30 UNO shots in a 4-1 triumph. His current 2.45 overall goals-against average is the fifth best of any WCHA puckstopper. During his three years with the Bulldogs, Reiter has posted the second-best career winning percentage (.580 off a 23-16-5 record, including a 10-6-5 figure this winter) of any NCAA I-era Bulldog in team history, trailing All-American Rick Kostl (60-18-2 for a .753 winning percentage between 1983-85).
- The Bulldogs have not been shut out in 85 straight WCHA games since coming up empty against North Dakota (2-0) on March 1, 2008 in Duluth.
- UMD will head into this weekend's playoff series against St. Cloud State armed with the nation's seventh best winning percentage (.667) and the WCHA's second most potent offense (3.43 goals per game).
- Travis Oleksuk's 13 goals this season (which is a career high) have come in a variety of ways and at some clutch times as well. The junior center, who has racked up a WCHA-best seven game-winning goals this season, has scored three times on the power play, once while a man down, once on a penalty shot and once with the goaltender pulled. Two of his goals thus far have been registered in overtime.
- All seven of sophomore right winger Mike Seidel's goals thus far in 2010-11 have been registered on the road.
- UMD has lost just twice (5-2 to UNO this past Saturday and 3-2 to visiting Wisconsin on Jan. 15) in its 16 series rematch games this season, going a 10-2-4.
- Of the 18 goals the senior left winger Kyle Schmidt has collected over the past two seasons (including seven in 2010-11), 16 have come in even-strength situations. Only two other Bulldogs (Mike Connolly with 22 and Jack Connolly with 18) has more. Schmidt, Kenny Reiter, Aaron Crandall and sophomore center Keegan

Flaherty were all recipients of a WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award for 2010-11.

- This winter, the Bulldogs have drawn over 100,000 spectators at home for their first time since the 1997-98 season, attracting 100,253 for 17 home dates for a school-record 5,897 per game average. They are averaging 6,658 in nine appearances at the 6,764-seat AMSOIL Arena and have played before five sellout crowds there.

Mavericks Minnesota State University

- Minnesota State enters the 2010-11 WCHA postseason with an overall record of 14-16-6 after losing twice at home to Alaska Anchorage (4-0 and 4-1). MSU finished the year in 11th place in the WCHA with a 8-16-4 league mark.
- MSU enters the first round of the league play-offs owning an all-time WCHA postseason mark of 9-24. The Mavericks have played 13 WCHA first-round play-off series and have two of these series (1999-00 vs. Alaska Anchorage and 2002-03 vs. Wisconsin).
- MSU square-off against Denver in this year's playoffs in marking the first time the two schools have met in the WCHA postseason. The Mavericks went 0-3-1 vs. the Pioneers this year and stand 13-22-6 all-time vs. DU.
- Minnesota State head coach Troy Jutting (MSU '87) is in his 11th year at the Maverick men's hockey helm and owns an all-time record of 172-198-53 (471).
- MSU's all-time record in 1,402 games played is 724-547-132 (.564).
- Sophomore forward Eriah Hayes, who led the Mavericks with five shots on goal in MSU's 4-0 loss to UAA last Friday, has 4-1=5 in the last six games. Hayes ranks third on the club scoring charts with 11-10=21. He leads the team in shots (126) and ranks second in goals (11).
- Junior forward Brett Peterson registered his first career goal when he tallied MSU's lone goal in the 4-1 loss to Alaska Anchorage last Saturday. The Elk River, Minn., product has appeared in three career games.
- Sophomore forward Eli Zuck, who assisted on Brett Peterson's goal last Saturday, is tied for eighth on the team scoring charts with 5-12=17 on the year. He's tied for fifth on the team in assists.
- Senior defenseman Channing Boe has tallied 2-1=3 during the last five games. Boe has 8-17=25 in 129 career games and has played in 75 consecutive games played to stand as MSU's leader in terms of longest active playing streak. He's second the team in plus-minus with a +8 for the year.
- Senior forward Andrew Sackrisson owns 17-35=52 in 122 career games. A fifth-round (124th overall) NHL draftee by St. Louis in 2006, Sackrisson has 2-9=11 in the last 18 games.
- Senior defenseman Kurt Davis has 20-74=94 in 148 career games to rank third on MSU's career scoring by defensemen list. Davis also ranks as MSU's all-time top-scoring defenseman for MSU's NCAA Division I era (he's tenth overall).
- Senior defenseman Ben Youds, who has 6-9=15 in his last 23 games played, has 10-56=66 and is +3 in 143 career games. Youds led the Mavericks in scoring last year and is 12th on MSU's all-time scoring by defensemen list (he's seventh for the school's DI era for defensemen).
- Freshman forward Chase Grant has 8-11=19 in 31 games to tie for fourth on MSU's scoring charts. He ranks as Minnesota States leader in +/- with a +9 on the year.
- Six Mavericks have played in all 35 games this year in Michael Dorr, Kurt Davis, Eriah Hayes, Justin Jokinen, Channing Boe and Tyler Elbrecht.
- MSU has outshot its opponents by a 1198 to 1116 margin on the year. The Mavericks have had at least 40 shots on goal six times in 2010-11.

Mavericks University of Nebraska Omaha

- UNO will make its WCHA playoff debut this weekend when it hosts fellow league newcomer Bemidji State on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, if necessary, March 11-13.
- The two teams played each other four times this season with the Beavers earning a 3-0-1 record against the Mavericks. UNO was 0-1-1 against Bemidji State at home. In fact, the Beavers were one of only four teams to beat the Mavericks at Qwest Center Omaha this season and the only team in the WCHA that the Mavericks did not beat at least once.
- UNO finished the regular season with a record of 21-13-2. The win total ties the second-highest single-season win total in school history, equaling the mark

set by the 2001-02 team.

- The Mavericks were 13-4-1 at home this season and are 29-7-3 at the Qwest Center during Dean Blais' tenure as head coach.
- The Mavericks finished the regular season with a split of two games at Minnesota Duluth last weekend. The Bulldogs won, 4-1, on Friday night, but the Mavericks rebounded for a 5-2 win on Saturday night to secure third place in the WCHA standings.
- UNO's third-place finish is the highest conference finish in school history. The previous high was fourth place in the Central Collegiate Hockey Association in the 2000-01 season.
- The Mavericks set a new school record with 17 conference wins this year (17-9-2). Their previous high was 15, also set by the 2000-01 squad.
- UNO's 5-2 win over Minnesota Duluth on Saturday was just the second win for the Mavericks against UMD, and it was their first in Duluth. Including Friday's setback, the Mavs had been 0-3-0 on the shores of Lake Superior.
- Of UNO's four home losses this year, only one has been by more than one goal – a 4-2 loss to Denver on Feb. 26.
- UNO is 16-5 all-time in home playoff games including a mark of 12-1 at Qwest Center Omaha. The Mavericks haven't been eliminated from the playoffs on home ice since 2002-03 when they lost in two games to Ohio State.
- The Mavericks are tied with Minnesota for fewest shorthanded goals allowed for all games played – 1.
- With a power-play goal last Saturday night, Matt Ambroz tied former UNO great David Brisson for 10th all-time for goals in a season with 17. He ranks fourth in UNO history with 22 career power-play goals.
- Ambroz hit another milestone in last Friday's game, playing in his 150th career game.
- With the win last Saturday, John Faulkner now has 20 wins this season, just one from tying the school record for wins in a season by a goaltender, a mark held by Dan Ellis.
- Alex Hudson scored the game-winning goal in last Saturday's 5-2, his team-leading fourth game-winner this season. He is just two from tying the school record for game-winners in a season set by Andrew Wong in 2000-01. He is now tied with Brandon Scero for fifth in career game-winning goals with eight.
- With two goals last Saturday, Terry Broadhurst became the seventh UNO player to score 10 or more goals this season, best among all WCHA teams. The others include Matt Ambroz – 17, Matt White – 14, Alex Hudson – 12, Joey Martin – 11, Rich Purslow – 11, and Brock Montpetit – 11).
- With two assists in last Saturday's 5-2 win over UMD, defenseman Eric Olimb took over the team lead in assists with 24. In the process, he snapped a six-game scoreless streak.
- Defenseman Bryce Aneloski also had two assists in last Saturday's win at UMD. Eight of his 16 assists this season have been scored in the last 10 games.
- Martin and Ambroz lead the Mavericks with 34 points. Ambroz leads the team with 17 goals, six powerplay goals and a +20 rating. Eric Olimb leads the team with 24 assists and leads all UNO defensemen with 27 points. Hudson leads the Mavs with four game-winning goals. Matt White leads all UNO freshmen with 22 points and is second on the team with 14 goals. Freshman defenseman Michael Young leads the team with two shorthanded goals. Aneloski leads the team with 54 blocked shots.

Fighting Sioux University of North Dakota

- Top-ranked UND (26-8-3, 21-6-1 WCHA) will host Michigan Tech in the first round of the WCHA playoffs.
- The Sioux won the MacNaughton Cup as WCHA regular season champions for the second time in three years, and upped their league-leading number of titles to 15.
- It is the ninth straight year UND will host the first round of the WCHA playoffs, the longest active streak in the league.
- When UND last won the MacNaughton Cup in 2008-09, it also hosted MTU in the first round of the playoffs, sweeping the best-of-three series.
- The Sioux are 142-90-9 (.608) all-time against the Huskies, including a 14-9-2 (.600) mark in the WCHA playoffs and a 79-33-4 (.698) edge in Grand Forks.
- The Sioux enter the playoffs on a nine-game unbeaten streak (8-0-1) and a five-game winning streak.
- UND closed out the regular season with a sweep in Houghton last weekend, winning 6-1 on Friday and 11-2 on Saturday. Last Saturday's 11-goal output was UND's largest since winning 11-2 at Alaska Anchorage on Jan. 17, 2003.
- Senior forward Matt Frattin had a goal and three assists last Friday, then added a goal and two assists on Saturday. His seven-point weekend enabled him to overcome a three-point deficit and win the WCHA scoring race by three points,

becoming UND's first WCHA scoring champion since Ryan Duncan in 2006-07. Frattin's 40 points are the most by a Sioux in league play since Jeff Panzer (49) and Bryan Lundbom (40) in 2000-01. Frattin, who is riding his second nine-game point streak of the season, also moved into a tie for the NCAA goal-scoring lead with his 28th and 29th goals of the season. He has 10 goals and 19 points over the last nine games.

- Sophomore goalie Aaron Dell won the WCHA goaltending title with a 1.97 goals-against average during 25 league games. Dell also led the WCHA in victories (19) and winning percentage (.812).
- Frattin and Dell are the first UND duo to win the WCHA scoring and goaltending titles since Jeff Panzer and Karl Goehring during UND's 1999-00 NCAA championship season.
- Junior winger Jason Gregoire enjoyed a six-point weekend at Michigan Tech, including a 3-goal, 1-assist effort on Saturday for his first career hat trick. Gregoire has racked up 14 goals and 23 points during a current 12-game point streak, a career long. Gregoire and Evan Trupp each surpassed the 100-career point milestones on Saturday.
- Junior forward Mario Lamoureux had four assists last Saturday, the most by a Sioux player this season. It was Lamoureux's first career game with more than two points.
- Junior Ben Blood leads the WCHA with a +28 plus/minus rating. He was a +5 on Friday and a +8 in the series at MTU.
- UND finished the regular season as the WCHA leader in goals (112), goals per game (4.00), fewest goals against (62), fewest goals-against per game (2.21), power-play (23.3%), special teams net (+14), and goal differential (+50).
- UND has gotten 172 points and 74 goals out of its seven seniors, more than any other senior class in the nation.
- UND won its 12th road game on Saturday, the most by the Sioux since winning a school-record 13 (13-3-3) in 2000-01.

Huskies

St. Cloud State University

- The Huskies completed their regular season with a weekend split at #5/6 Denver. SCSU posted a 3-2 win on March 4 and suffered a 3-2 setback on March 5 at Magness Arena. This marked the 9th and 10th consecutive games that the Huskies had faced a nationally ranked opponent to complete their 2010-11 regular season. According to USCHO.com KRACH rankings, the Huskies have played the second strongest schedule in Division I hockey this winter.
- Sophomore forward Ben Hanowski added two goals in the series at Denver on March 4-5. He is now tied for the team's goal scoring lead this winter along with junior forward Drew LeBlanc with 13 goal apiece. Hanowski also has seven helpers this season for a total of 20 points this winter. LeBlanc continues to lead the Huskies with 39 points and 26 assists in 2010-11.
- SCSU will meet up with Minnesota Duluth at AMSOIL Arena on March 11-13 in the first round of the WCHA playoffs. Earlier this year, the Huskies scored an 8-2 win on Feb. 11 and a 3-3 OT tie on Feb. 12 against UMD at AMSOIL Arena. The Huskies currently own a six-game unbeaten streak against UMD, which dates back to a 5-1 loss against the Bulldogs on Nov. 29, 2008.
- SCSU is 54-37-7 in the all-time series against UMD, which dates back to an 8-1 win by the Huskies in 1946-47.
- In the WCHA playoffs, the Huskies own a 25-21-0 record in first round games played since SCSU joined the league in 1990-91. SCSU is 9-16-0 in first round games played on the road and the Huskies have posted an 18-6-0 record in first round games played at the NHC. In the last five years, SCSU has been on the road twice for WCHA First Round games. In first round series played on the road, the Huskies have advance to the Final Five three times in 1996, 1999 and 2005. The last time the Huskies advanced to the Final Five during a road series in the first round was in 2006 with a 2-1 series edge at Colorado College in Coach Bob Motzko's first season with the Huskies.
- SCSU has advanced to the Final Five 12 times since 1994. Last year, the Huskies scored a 2-0 win over Wisconsin in the semi-finals of the Final Five and then lost a 5-3 decision against North Dakota in the battle for the Broadmoor Trophy on March 20, 2010.
- In first round playoff action against Minnesota Duluth, the Huskies own a 9-4 edge. History was made the last time SCSU and UMD met in the WCHA First Round at the NHC in 2007. UMD gained a 3-1 win in game one on March 9, 2007. In game two, the Huskies stayed alive with a 3-2 OT victory. To clinch the trip to St. Paul, the Huskies survived an epic triple OT game that ended with the game-winner by Andreas Nodl to give the Huskies a 3-2 win. The game set a team record for

longest game played at 11:33 and the legendary Bobby Goepfert made a team record 67 saves in the contest that ended at 11:23 p.m. That night in St. Cloud.

- The last time that SCSU and UMD played a first round series in Duluth, the Huskies lost the series 2-1 in 2003. In game one, UMD posted a 5-4 win on March 14, 2003. SCSU replied with a 3-2 OT win on March 15, 2003 before falling 7-3 in game three of the series. SCSU and UMD have met five times in the WCHA first round, which is the most of any WCHA rival for the Huskies.

Senior forward Garrett Roe now has 65 goals, 112 assists and 177 career points with the Huskies. He needs three points to move ahead of Jeff Saterdalen (179 points from 1988-92) into second place on the Huskies' all-time point leader list. Ryan Lasch is SCSU's all-time point leader with 184 points from 2006-10.

- Sophomore goalie Mike Lee is 12-12-4 this winter with a 2.79 goals-against average.

Badgers

University of Wisconsin

- Wisconsin men's hockey (20-14-4, 12-13-3 WCHA) opens the postseason with the first round of the best-of-three WCHA playoffs. The Badgers visit Colorado College (19-16-3, 13-13-2 WCHA) to play what will be their third, fourth and possibly fifth consecutive games against the Tigers.
- The Badgers split in the regular season's final weekend at the Kohl Center, falling 3-2 before claiming a 3-1 victory.
- This season marks the sixth time in school history UW will open the first round of the WCHA playoffs against the same team it played in the regular season's final weekend. Other occurrences came in 2007-08 and 1991-92 against St. Cloud State, 1987-88 against Northern Michigan, 1978-79 against Notre Dame, and 1972-73 against Minnesota. UW won four of the previous five such playoff series.
- UW's victory last Saturday against Colorado College snapped a seven-game winless streak (0-6-1).
- UW won its 20th game of the season for the sixth time in nine seasons under Head Coach Mike Eaves and for the 34th time in school history.
- Sophomore Justin Schultz scored his 18th goal of the season last Saturday, tying him for second on UW's single-season goal-scoring list for defensemen, just one behind UW's single season record set by Sean Hill in 1990-91.
- Junior Jake Gardiner scored his 10th goal of the season last Friday, giving UW two defensemen with double figures in goals, which marks the seventh time that has happened for the Badgers and the first time since 1989-90 when Sean Hill and Barry Richter both reached the 10-goal mark.
- Senior forward Patrick Johnson scored goals in both games last weekend, including the game-winning tally on Saturday to give him four goals in his last three games, as well as goals in four of his last five and five of his last nine games played.
- Senior goaltender Scott Gudmandson returned to the All-WCHA-like form he showed most of the season with a 33-save performance in UW's 3-1 victory this past Saturday.

WCHA Men's Tie-Breaking Procedures - For Playoff Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All 12 teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #12 rank, #2 rank vs #11 rank, #3 vs #10, #4 vs #9, #5 vs #8, and #6 vs #7.

Following the six first round series, the six winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #6 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA Final Five.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.
