**WCHA Week Three:
Season Kicks into High Gear with Three League Series**

*No. 1 Minnesota and UMD renew I-35 rivalry, while unbeaten No. 2 Wisconsin and Ohio State collide;
Minnesota State opens its season against No. 10 North Dakota*

Opening Face-Off

- **Intrastate Rivalry Renewed:** Top-ranked Minnesota opens its WCHA schedule this weekend with a trip to AMSOIL Arena and a series with Minnesota Duluth. The storied I-35 rivalry pits two programs that have each won five national championships apiece.
- **Pair of Unbeaten Teams Meet in Madison:** No. 2 Wisconsin, 4-0-0 thus far, hosts an Ohio State squad that swept its season-opening series. The teams will meet Friday and Sunday.
- **Mavericks Open Season and Huskies Return Home:** Minnesota State, idle the first two weekends of the season, opens its 2014-15 campaign by hosting No. 10 North Dakota in a league series. St. Cloud State hosts Lindenwood in non-conference action, as new Huskies head coach makes his regular season debut at the Herb Brooks National Hockey Center.

Three Stars

- **Starting Strong:** Under the guidance of first year head coach Jim Scanlan, Bemidji State is off to the first 4-0-0 start in program history. Ohio State swept visiting New Hampshire last weekend to record just the seventh season-opening sweep in Buckeyes annals.
- **Top of the Charts:** Minnesota and Wisconsin remain 1-2 in both the USCHO.com and USA Today / USA Hockey Magazine polls, while North Dakota is 10th in the USCHO ledger. Bemidji State's fast start has the Beavers receiving votes in both polls, while Minnesota Duluth earned recognition from USCHO voters.
- **WCHA at the Four Nations Cup:** Continuing to make a mark on international ice, 10 current or former WCHA players have been named to the U.S. Women's National Team that will compete in the Four Nations Cup, Nov. 4-8 in Kamloops, British Columbia. *(See page 3 for more)*

The Week Ahead: Gophers, Bulldogs Meet in I-35 Rivalry Series

The women's Western Collegiate Hockey Association season kicks into high gear Oct. 10-12 with three league series, highlighted by the renewal of a great interstate rivalry, Minnesota Duluth vs. Minnesota.

This I-35 rivalry between programs which have each won five national championships moves to Duluth's AMSOIL Arena Friday night. The top-ranked Gophers (2-0-0), the two-time WCHA champions, have had the better of rivalry lately – winning the last 11 games, dating back to Jan. 14, 2012.

Minnesota enters this weekend's series with a 41-24-6 all-time mark against Minnesota Duluth (0-2-0-0, 0 points in WCHA play and 1-2-1 overall). Most recently, Minnesota defeated UMD, 4-1, in the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF semifinal round on March 7, 2014 in Bemidji.

In other WCHA and non-conference play this weekend:

- Ohio State (2-0-0) travels to No. 2 Wisconsin (4-0-0, 2-0-0-0, 4 points) for games Friday night and Sunday afternoon in Madison's LaBahn Arena. Historically, Wisconsin leads the all-time series against Ohio State 53-9-6, having won six straight and 14 of the last 16 contests.
- Minnesota State plays its first game of the season and hosts No. 10 North Dakota (1-1) Friday and Saturday at All Seasons Arena in Mankato. The two teams split four games last season, while the Mavericks hold an all-time 24-16-6 edge.
- St. Cloud State (02-0) entertains Lindenwood this Friday and Saturday in the home debut of new head coach **Erik Rud**.

The Week That Was: WCHA Continues Strong Non-conference Showing

Perfect weekends from Bemidji State, Minnesota, Ohio State and a split from North Dakota helped WCHA teams up the league's early-season non-conference record to 12-3-1 (.781).

Bemidji State knocked off both Rensselaer and Vermont by identical 4-0 scores at the Sanford Center in Bemidji. It was the first time BSU posted back-to-back shutouts since Jan. 5 and 11, 2013 (against Minnesota State and St. Cloud State), while the two victories gave BSU the best start in program history (4-0-0) plus a school record for the longest winning streak (four). New head coach **Jim Scanlan** got shutouts from each member of his goaltending tandem, freshman **Erin Deters** and **Brittini Mowat**. Eight different Beavers scored on the weekend, led by **Megan Lushanko**, who had a goal and two assists.

Minnesota jumped off to an impressive start with an 8-0 victory over Penn State and a 5-2 win over Boston University, the team the Gophers have eliminated in the NCAA tournament each of the last two seasons. In the Gophers' season opener, redshirt freshman goalie **Sidney Peters** had a 15-save shutout and six different Gophers scored goals. **Hannah Brandt** led the team with three points, **Milica McMillen** tallied a pair of power-play goals and **Dani Cameranesi** also scored twice. **Meghan Lorence**

had a pair of goals against BU and freshman **Cara Piazza** scored in both of her first collegiate games.

In the other half of the women's hockey doubleheader at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis last weekend, St. Cloud State fell to BU 5-2 and lost to Penn State 3-2. When **Molly Illikainen** scored 6:32 into the third period, the Huskies tied the nationally-ranked Terriers at 2-2 and were thinking upset. But BU gained the advantage with just over five minutes to go and added two more late tallies for the win. **Payge Pena** gave the Huskies a 2-1 lead halfway through their game with Penn State, but the Nittany Lions rallied late. Illikainen had another goal and netminder **Katie Fitzgerald** made 21 stops against PSU.

Ohio State got off to a 2-0 start for the seventh time in program history by beating New Hampshire twice in Columbus, Ohio. **Claudia Kepler's** goal at 5:06 of the second period stood up as the game's only goal in the series opener as freshman goalie **Kassidy Sauve** made 24 stops. Kepler had the game-winner again Saturday, finding the back of the net to give the Buckeyes a 4-3 victory. **Danielle Gagne**, **Kayla Sullivan**, and **Alexa Ranahan** scored early to give OSU a 3-0 lead, only to see UNH to come back.

No. 2 North Dakota split a pair of non-conference games in Grand Forks, N.D., blowing out Rensselaer, 7-1, on Friday night behind a hat trick from **Becca Kohler** and a pair of goals by **Marissa Salo**. UND ran into hot goaltending Saturday night, mustering only a **Josefine Jakobsen** goal in a 3-1 loss to visiting Vermont.

Second-ranked Wisconsin opened the WCHA season by winning a pair of road games. Badgers rookie **Emily Clark** had two goals, while **Brittany Ammerman** and **Courtney Burke** added empty-netters in a 4-1 win Friday. Wisconsin completed the sweep with a 6-2 win on Saturday behind two goals each from **Sarah Nurse** and **Blayre Turnbull**. Goalie **Ann-Renée Desbiens** earned her first two wins of the season, leading the Badgers to just their third-ever sweep in Duluth.



Coaches Pick Defending Champ Minnesota as WCHA Favorite in 2014-15

The coaches from the women's Western Collegiate Hockey Association stayed with a familiar choice for the 2014-15 season: Once again, the University of Minnesota is the preseason pick to win the championship of a league that has 14 Division I women's national championships in its 15 years of existence.

Minnesota has advanced to the NCAA championship game in each of the last three seasons and won two titles. The Gophers, who also won the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF playoff championship the last three seasons and are the two-time defending WCHA regular season champions, collected six first place votes and 48 points in the annual poll of the league's eight head coaches.

Wisconsin, another NCAA Frozen Four team last season, placed second in the coaches' poll with 44 points and two first place votes. Minnesota Duluth (34 points) edged out a third national top-ten team from a year ago, North Dakota (33 points), for third place in the coaches' poll.

Ohio State, with 26 points, was selected to finish in fifth place, while Minnesota State was tabbed for sixth. Bemidji State was picked as the seventh place finisher, just ahead of St. Cloud State.

Minnesota junior forward Hannah Brandt, the WCHA Player of the Year last season, was the coaches' unanimous preseason choice for the same honors in 2014-15. Wisconsin freshman forward Annie Pankowski is the head coaches' preseason choice as WCHA Rookie of the Year.

Claudia Kepler, So., F, Ohio State

Kepler, a sophomore from Verona, Wis., tallied the game-winning goals in both games of the Buckeyes' sweep of New Hampshire. In Saturday's series finale, she found the back of the net with 31.1 seconds remaining in regulation to lift OSU to a 4-3 win and series sweep. Kepler also scored Ohio State's lone goal in a 1-0, shutout victory in Friday night's series opener. The game-winners vs. UNH marked the first and second of her Buckeye career.

Bemidji State University Beavers

- The Beavers (4-0-0), idle the weekend of Oct. 10-11, knocked off both Rensselaer and Vermont Oct. 4-5 by identical 4-0 scores. It was the first time BSU posted back-to-back shutouts since Jan. 5, 11, 2013 versus Minnesota State and St. Cloud State.
- With the pair of wins, Bemidji State not only improves upon the best start in program history (4-0-0) but it also matches a program record for the longest winning streak (4).
- BSU improves to 1-0-0 versus RPI and 4-0-1 against Vermont. The win over RPI was the first ever victory for BSU over a member of the ECAC conference.
- The Beavers have had a varied offense attack this season as 17 of 21 skaters have scored at least one point.
- Junior **Megan Lushanko** continues to have breakout season as she added three more points this weekend (1 goal, 2 assists). Lushanko leads the Beavers in scoring with five points (2 goals, 3 assists).
- Freshman **Reilly Fawcett** made her collegiate debut Sunday versus Vermont and started her career with a two-point game, with a pair of assists.
- Defenseman **Ivana Bilic** had a pair of assists and a +3 plus/minus rating. The Coquitlam, British Columbia native has scored a point in all four of BSU's games.
- Goalie **Brittini Mowat** made 28 saves in BSU's 4-0 win over Vermont Sunday. It was Mowat's fourth career shutout and her 12th career win. Despite being a sophomore, Mowat ranks third in shutouts (4) and is tied with former Beaver goaltender Anik Cote for fifth on the all-time wins list (12).
- Goaltender **Erin Deters** also posted a shutout this weekend over RPI. It was Deters' first career shutout. The Sartell, Minn. native has a 2-0-0 record with a 0.50 goals against average and .978 save percentage.
- The eight-member junior class has accounted for 27 of the team's 42 points.
- First-year head coach **Jim Scanlan** has won his first four games. Scanlan, a former BSU goaltender, replaced Steve Sertich who retired following last season.
- Bemidji State will be idle this weekend before opening up Western Collegiate Hockey Association play Oct. 17-18 at the Ohio State University.



University of Minnesota Golden Gophers

- The No. 1 Golden Gophers (2-0-0) opened the 2014-15 season with wins over Penn State and No. 6 Boston University last weekend. The Gophers defeated PSU, 8-0, before earning a 5-2 win over BU at home at Ridder Arena.
- The Gophers open WCHA play this weekend, traveling to No. 10 Minnesota Duluth. Puck drop is set for 6:07 p.m. Friday and Saturday at AMSOIL Arena.
- In Minnesota's 8-0 win over Penn State, six different Gophers scored goals and junior **Hannah Brandt** led the team with three points. Brandt set up two Minnesota goals and scored one of her own. Fellow junior **Milica McMillen** scored a pair of power-play goals, and sophomore **Dani Cameranesi** also scored twice.
- Redshirt freshman goaltender **Sidney Peters** made 15 saves in her first collegiate game. Peters backstopped the Gophers to a shutout victory as Minnesota outshot Penn State, 48-15.
- On Saturday, senior **Meghan Lorence** led Minnesota past Boston University, 5-2, with two goals. Minnesota killed off eight Boston University power plays, including two five-on-three advantages for the Terriers, and junior goaltender **Amanda Leveille** made 26 saves in her first game of the season.
- After two games, **Rachael Bona** (4a), **Lorence** (3g-1a), **Hannah Brandt** (2g-2a) and **Lee Stecklein** (4a) lead the Gophers with four points each on the season. They are tied for eighth in the nation with 2.00 points per game. Lorence and McMillen are tied for fourth in the NCAA with 1.50 goals per game, and Bona and Stecklein are tied for third in the nation with 2.00 assists per game.
- McMillen scored both game-winning goals for the Gophers over the weekend and leads the NCAA with two game-winning goals on the year. With three points on three goals in two games this season, she joins Stecklein (4a) and **Rachael Ramsey** (3a) ranked in the nation's top five for scoring among defensemen.
- Rookies **Cara Piazza** (2g) and **Nina Rodgers** (1a) picked up their first collegiate points over the weekend. Piazza scored one goal in each game, and Rodgers assisted a Meghan Lorence goal against Penn State. All four Gopher freshmen made their collegiate debuts over the weekend as **Sydney Baldwin** and **Kelly Pannek** also donned Maroon & Gold.
- With 13 goals in two games, the Gophers' offense ranks second in the nation, averaging 6.50 goals per game. Minnesota's 1.00 goals against average is tied for fifth in the NCAA.
- At six-for-nine, Minnesota leads the nation with a .667 power play percentage. The Gophers' penalty kill is also tied for the NCAA's best at a perfect 12-for-12.
- Minnesota enters this weekend's series with a 41-24-6 all-time mark against Minnesota Duluth. The Gophers have won 11-straight games against the Bulldogs, dating back to Jan. 14, 2012. Most recently, Minnesota defeated UMD, 4-1, in the WCHA Final Face-off semifinal round on March 7, 2014.
- Minnesota is 97-3-2 in its last 102 games, including an NCAA-record 62-game winning streak (Feb. 28, 2012 through Nov. 17, 2013).

University of Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs

- The Bulldogs (0-2-0-0, 0 points, 1-2-1) were swept on the weekend by No. 2 Wisconsin by scores of 4-1 Friday night and 6-2 Saturday.
- In the series opener, UMD was within a single goal late into the third period after senior winger **Zoe Hickel** scored at the 16:15 mark to pull the Bulldogs to 2-1, but Wisconsin finished two empty net goals to dash any UMD upset hopes in the final 50 seconds of play. UMD was a perfect 6-of-6 on the penalty kill.
- On Saturday, the Bulldogs scored first on another goal by Hickel, but the Badgers scored four unanswered goals over the course of seven minutes to blow the game open 4-1 by the 5:16 mark of the second period. **Jenna McParland** cut UW's lead to 5-2 39 seconds into the third period, but UMD would come no closer.
- UMD falls to 29-33-11 all-time against the Badgers. The Bulldogs are also 16-14-5 when hosting UW in Duluth all-time.
- After averaging 46.5 shots heading into the series against Wisconsin, UMD averaged just 19.5 this past weekend.
- Hickel has notched a point in her first four games, having netted three goals and an assist for a team-high tie four points. Sophomore center **Lara Stalder** also has four points on two goals and two assists.

- MSU will have to rely on some with this season after bringing in 12 newcomers to replace 11 letter-winners that were lost from last season.
- The Mavericks' 2014-15 roster boasts players from five different countries including the United States, Canada, Germany, Norway and Sweden.
- Rogan returns as the Mavericks top point scorer going 11-10--21 in 36 games played last season.
- Senior defenseman **Shelby Moteyunas** produced three goals and 10 assists last season. Moteyunas led all Maverick blueliners with 54 shots and was second in points with 13 in 2013-14.
- **Eric Means** is coming off one of his best seasons as head coach of the Mavericks. He led the team to a 13-23-1 record which is the most wins in a single season under Means.
- MSU will look to improve upon its scoring opportunities from a season ago in which it averaged just under two goals per game and 27.3 shots per game.
- The Mavericks were picked to finish sixth in the WCHA Head Coaches' Poll for the second-consecutive season earning 17 points.

The Catamounts goaltender, Madison Litchfield, led Vermont to a 3-1 victory over North Dakota, stopping 29-of-30 shots she faced. **Josefine Jakobsen** was the lone goal scorer for UND in the contest, notching her second goal of the season.
- Goaltenders **Shelby Amsley-Benzie** and **Lexie Shaw** shared netminding duties over the weekend, as Amsley-Benzie stopped 20-of-21 shots to pick up the win against RPI. Shaw was in net against Vermont, making 19 saves in the loss.
- The trio of Dufault, Jakobsen and Kohler were the only three to record points in both games over the weekend. In the two games, Dufault tallied five assists, Jakobsen had two goals and one assists and Kohler had three goals and one assist.
- Kohler recorded her first career hat trick on Oct. 3 against RPI, scoring one goal each period against the Engineers. Prior to her hat trick, Kohler had never scored more than one goal in a single game.
- Dufault recorded five assists on eight of the UND goals scored over the Oct. 3-4 weekend to open the season. She had four assists in the Oct. 3 game against RPI and helped on the lone UND goal scored against Vermont on Oct. 4. Dufault is currently fourth all-time in program history with 43 assists.
- Sophomore **Marissa Salo** scored her first two collegiate goals in the Oct. 3 game against RPI. Salo went without a point during her freshman season, but scored UND's fourth and seventh goals in this season's first game.

- UND brings in two new faces to the team this season: **Jordan Hampton** and **Kara Tupa**. Hampton is a sophomore transfer from Northeastern University. Tupa, a Fargo, N.D., native, most recently played for the Honeybaked team that won the MAHA Girls Tier I State Championship in 2014.
- North Dakota returns 82-percent of its total offense. The returning 21 letter winners accounted for 73-of-96 goals and 125-of-146 assists for UND in 2013-14.
- The 2014-15 roster features players from six different countries. Four players hail from outside of North America: Dalen (Norway), Eisenschmid (Germany), Fallman (Sweden), Jakobsen (Denmark).
- UND forwards Dufault and Kohler and defenseman Krzyzaniak were among 58 invited to skate at Canada's National Women's Team Fall Festival, which took place Sept. 22-28.

- The Buckeyes (2-0-0) swept New Hampshire over the weekend by scores of 1-0 and 4-3. It is the seventh 2-0-0 start in program history for OSU.
